Biblical aggression requires a knowledge of the word of God

Psalm 119:11

Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee.

Matthew 4:4

But Jesus answered, “It is written: ‘Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.’”

Proverbs 2:1-5

My son, if thou wilt receive my words, and hide my commandments with thee;

2 So that thou incline thine ear unto wisdom, and apply thine heart to understanding;

3 Yea, if thou criest after knowledge, and liftest up thy voice for understanding;

4 If thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for her as for hid treasures;

Repentance and Renunciation

It is essential to recognize the necessity of undoing the agreements made with evil spirits by means of presenting your case for freedom to Jesus.

: Repentance means “to turn away from” and “to turn to”.
