Discussion Questions

Luke Part 1: The Temptation of Christ

Luke 4:1-13

1. When we look at Jesus' life, from His birth to His temptation in Luke 4, His life is already full of difficulty and discomfort. And yet we seem to have an expectation that our lives will be exempt from the same kind of pain our Savior went through. Why do you think that is? Why do you think we get so shocked when suffering and temptation comes?
2. Read 2 Cor. 11:3. What does this show us about Satan's goals for us? Why is that significant?
3. Read James 1:12-17. What does this passage show us about how temptation works?
4. Read Luke 4:1-13. What would be wrong about each of the 3 temptations presented to Jesus? What would He be doing wrong if He gave in?
5. What do these temptations teach us about how Satan may tempt us in a less obvious way, or a way that doesn't first appear to be wrong? How might Satan try to tempt you personally in a way that at first would seem fine to you?
6. How did Jesus respond to the three temptations? What can we learn by His example?
7. Be encouraged that even when you don't fully stand the test, Jesus has on your behalf. His life is your life, His death is your death, so that you may rejoice in His victory and be strengthened against the work of the enemy.

Communion: We take Communion every Sunday as a church body. At his last supper with his disciples, Jesus "took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, 'This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.'" (Luke 22:19). Repeating this act is a powerful image of our ongoing covenant renewal with the once crucified and now resurrected Christ. Anyone who believe in Jesus Christ as their personal savior are welcome to grab a cup from the tables at the front or back of the auditorium and eat it on your own during the following song. There is juice on the top and a cracker underneath.
