

I Have Found a Home in the House

CENTRAL QUESTION:

What do we do when the failures and shame of those who came before us seem to define who we are today?

I. THE SONG OF THE SONS (PSALM 84:1-4)

Key Scripture: Psalm 84:1-4 "How amiable are thy tabernacles, O LORD of hosts! My soul longeth, yea, even fainteth for the courts of the LORD... The sparrow hath found a house, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may lay her young, even thine altars, O LORD of hosts, my King, and my God. Blessed are they that dwell in thy house: they will be still praising thee."

Context of the Song:

- A psalm written by or for the Sons of Korah
- Written for the courts of the Lord
- A song of longing and worship
- God cares about the smallest creatures
- If He gives the sparrow a home, He surely has a place for us

II. THE WEIGHT OF AN INHERITED NAME

The Backstory (Numbers 16):

- Korah was a Levite, a cousin of Moses and Aaron
- He led a rebellion against their leadership
- 250 men of renown joined him
- They accused Moses and Aaron of exalting themselves

The Judgment:

- The earth opened her mouth and swallowed Korah
- Fire consumed the 250 men
- A whole family line was marked by shame
- But the sons of Korah did not die (Numbers 26:11)

Key Truth:

Sometimes the closest people to us will oppose what God has called us to do. Family members can try to undermine our calling and speak negatively about us. Stay rooted in what God has spoken to you.

III. THE POWER OF A DIFFERENT CHOICE

The Sons Made a Decision:

- They separated themselves from their father's rebellion
- They were not in close proximity when judgment fell
- They declared, "We don't want any part of what our fathers are about"
- They repented and chose faithfulness

The Legacy of Faithfulness:

- The sons of Korah became Levites
- They served as gatekeepers, musicians, and singers
- They served faithfully for hundreds of years
- God can redeem any family line

Key Truth:

You do not have to carry the failures of your father or mother. What your family was known for does not have to be your future. God has a place for you apart from the mistakes of those who came before you.

IV. FROM SHAME TO SONG

The Transformation:

- Korah's descendants became a vital part of Israel's worship
- During David's reign, they were known for leading worship through music
- They are credited with writing Psalms 42, 46, and 84
- A line marked by rebellion became a line marked by worship

Key Truth:

God can take your family history of pain and turn it into a song of praise. The same mouth that was once used for rebellion can be used to proclaim the goodness of God for generations.

V. GOD HAS A PLACE FOR YOU

The Promise of Scripture:

- Psalm 23:6 "I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever"
- Psalm 27:4 "One thing have I desired of the LORD... that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life"
- Psalm 91:1 "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty"
- John 14:23 "If a man love me, he will keep my words: and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him, and make our abode with him"

- Revelation 21:3 "The tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them"

What the House of God Provides:

- Refuge from the storm
- Strength when you feel weak
- Healing for your body and soul
- A place to belong
- A sense of direction and identity

Key Truth:

The house of God is not just a building or a membership roll. It is a place of safety, accountability, and restoration. You may feel like the world is spinning around you, but when you walk through those doors, you can find peace, joy, and hope. You can look around and see the testimonies of God moving in the lives of ordinary people.

VI. LIVING IT OUT (PRACTICAL APPLICATION)

For Those Who Feel Misplaced:

- If you have no place to belong, God has a place for you
- If you feel far from the Lord, now is the time to draw near
- If people are trying to undermine your calling, hold fast to what God has spoken

Daily Practice:

1. Remember the day God spoke to you about your calling
2. Retreat to the house of God as your place of safety
3. Stand in the middle of His will and trust that all of heaven backs you up
4. Trust that when you are where God wants you to be, angels are dispatched on your behalf

The Challenge:

Will you find your home in the house of God today, no matter what your family history looks like?

KEY TAKEAWAY:

No matter what your father did. No matter what your mother did. No matter what your family is known for. God has a place for you in His house. The same God who cares for the sparrow and the swallow knows you by name and has prepared a home for you. You can leave the shame of your past behind and dwell in His presence forever.

FOR FURTHER REFLECTION:

- How has your family history shaped the way you see yourself?

- Are there areas where you need to separate yourself from the patterns of those who came before you?
- What does the "house of God" mean to you personally?
- Can you remember a specific moment when God spoke to you about your purpose?
- How can you make the house of God a place of refuge and healing in your daily life?
