# **Back To the Water Gate**

#### **Central Theme:**

What happens when God's people return to the Word, and how true worship refreshes and cleanses us.

Primary Scripture:

Nehemiah 8:1-12; Nehemiah 9:1-3

# I. Opening and Update (00:00–00:03)

- Building update, 4 a.m. storm story, urgent prayer, and God's protection of the new ductwork
- Invitation to glimpse the new building with caution due to construction debris and dust

# II. Setting the Scene: Why Nehemiah 8 Matters (00:03–00:08)

- Israel's 70-year exile because of sin and disobedience, including neglect of Sabbath years
- Babylon's siege, destruction of Jerusalem and the temple, deportations (e.g., Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, Abednego)
- Return, rebuilding the walls and gates; some refused the work, others completed it

### III. The Gathering at the Water Gate (00:08–00:10)

- Feast of Trumpets timing; Ezra on a wooden platform with leaders
- Public reading of the Law; people stand, lift hands, say "Amen," bow, and worship
- Levites scatter among the crowd to explain the meaning so all could understand

# IV. What True Worship Is and Isn't (00:13–00:15)

- Worship begins with the Word; music serves worship but is not the core
- Honest naming of sin rather than softening or excusing it

# V. Identity and Holiness in a Babylon Culture (00:15–00:19)

- Call sin what it is; resist the world's DNA and embrace God's
- Appeal to youth and parents: prioritize discipleship over popularity and sports
- Parents, lead your homes to love Scripture and God's presence

# VI. Why the Water Gate Matters (00:20–00:23)

- The city's twelve gates, with the Water Gate chosen for the reading
- Water's two purposes: refreshment and cleansing
- The Word refreshes with God's promises and cleanses by conviction

# VII. From Conviction to Joy (00:23–00:26)

- People weep as they hear the Word and realize they've fallen short
- Leaders urge rejoicing because the day is holy; the joy of the Lord is strength
- Warning against compromise in speech, media, and company kept

# VIII. Stand Firm, Even If Unpopular (00:26–00:29)

- America at a turning point; stand for truth over popularity
- Goal of pastoral ministry: equip people to stand in the end times

# IX. A Whole-Church Moment (00:29-00:30)

- Men, women, and children old enough to understand gathered together
- United purpose: we are in the world but not of it; embrace God-given identity

# X. Repentance and Rhythms of Renewal (00:31–00:35)

- Choose God's identity over generational scripts of sin
- Feast of Booths remembrance of God's provision

- Nehemiah 9 pattern: extended time in the Word followed by confession and repentance
- Take responsibility; stop making excuses for sin

#### XI. Back to the Word All Week (00:35–00:37)

- Many believers are weak because they don't engage Scripture between Sundays
- The pastor's role is to feed and protect; the Word's role is to correct and free

#### XII. Home, Legacy, and Wise Parenting (00:37–00:40)

- Raise children to stand on their own in faith and life
- Train up a child; model holiness and wise boundaries

#### XIII. What Really Draws People (00:40–00:41)

- · Not popularity but the presence of the Holy Spirit draws hearts
- Note on Jerusalem's rebuilt city and gates as a context for revival

#### XIV. A Scent of Renewal (00:41–00:42)

 Humorous cologne moment used as an illustration: the "fragrance" of cleansing and refreshing life

#### XV. Final Call: Back to the Water Gate (00:42–00:44)

- God delights to bless obedience, but He's not obligated to bless disobedience
- Valleys grow us because the stream runs there; return to the Word for refreshing and cleansing

### Key Takeaways

- Worship begins with the Word of God, which both refreshes and cleanses
- Embrace God's identity over Babylon's culture
- Pair conviction with rejoicing; the joy of the Lord is strength

Households thrive when parents lead in Scripture and prayer
