I. Introduction: From Terror to Security

A. Recap of Last Week

Do you remember where we left off last week? The sixth seal had just been opened, and creation itself was coming apart at the seams. The sun turned black. The moon became like blood. Stars fell from heaven like figs shaken from a tree. Mountains and islands moved from their places. The sky vanished like a scroll being rolled up.

And what did people do? Kings and generals, the rich and the powerful, slaves and free people all ran to the mountains. They hid in caves and among rocks. They cried out to the mountains and rocks, "Fall on us and hide us from the face of him who is seated on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb."

Then came that haunting question that ended chapter 6: "Who can stand in the great day of their wrath?"

The question hung in the air like smoke after an explosion. It seemed like the answer was nobody. No one could stand. Everyone was running, hiding, begging for rocks to crush them rather than face God's judgment.

But here's what I told you last week. God had an answer. Chapter 7 would show us people standing before the throne and before the Lamb. Not hiding. Not running. Standing.

B. God's Answer Begins

Chapter 7 opens differently than chapter 6 ended. Instead of more terror, we find hope. Instead of destruction, we see protection. Instead of people running from God, we discover people secured by God.

This is what Bible scholars call an "interlude." It's like God pressing pause on the judgment sequence to show us something we desperately need to see. The sixth seal brought cosmic

chaos. The seventh seal will bring even more intensity. But right here, between the terror and the trumpet judgments, God gives us a glimpse of His protection plan.

Think of it like a movie that cuts away from the action scene to show you what's happening behind the scenes. While judgment is about to fall, God is busy sealing His people. While the world shakes, God's servants receive His unbreakable mark of protection.

C. Preview of Today's Focus

Today we're looking at <u>Revelation 7:1-8</u>. This passage answers the question that's been haunting us: "Who can stand?"

Here's the big idea we'll discover together: God seals His servants before judgment proceeds. He doesn't throw His people into the fire and hope they survive. He marks them as His own and protects them through whatever comes.

The key question we need to answer is this: What does it mean to be sealed by God? What is this seal? How do you get it? What does it do? And what difference should it make in your life right now?

Let me read our passage, and then we'll dig into these questions together:

Revelation 7:1-8 ESV

¹ After this I saw four angels standing at the four corners of the earth, holding back the four winds of the earth, that no wind might blow on earth or sea or against any tree. ² Then I saw another angel ascending from the rising of the sun, with the seal of the living God, and he called with a loud voice to the four angels who had been given power to harm earth and sea, ³ saying, "Do not harm the earth or the sea or the trees, until we have sealed the servants of our God on their foreheads." ⁴ And I heard the number of the sealed, 144,000, sealed from every tribe of the sons of Israel: ⁵ 12,000 from the tribe of Judah were sealed, 12,000 from the tribe of Reuben, 12,000 from the tribe of Gad, ⁶ 12,000 from the tribe of Asher, 12,000 from the tribe of Naphtali, 12,000 from the tribe of Manasseh, ⁷ 12,000 from the tribe of Simeon, 12,000 from the tribe of Levi, 12,000 from the tribe of Issachar, ⁸ 12,000 from the tribe of Zebulun, 12,000 from the tribe of Joseph, 12,000 from the tribe of Benjamin were sealed.

From terror to security. From "Who can stand?" to "Here are the people who can stand." That's where we're headed today.

II. The Pause: Judgment Restrained (7:1-3)

A. The Scene: Four Angels, Four Winds (v. 1)

Revelation 7:1 ESV

¹ After this I saw four angels standing at the four corners of the earth, holding back the four winds of the earth, that no wind might blow on earth or sea or against any tree.

John sees four angels standing at the four corners of the earth. They're holding back the four winds of the earth. No wind can blow on earth or sea or against any tree.

This isn't a weather report. The word "winds" here is the Greek word *anemos*. In apocalyptic literature like Revelation, winds represent forces of destruction and chaos. These aren't gentle breezes. They're hurricane-force agents of judgment.

The four corners of the earth means every direction. North, south, east, west. The judgment these angels are restraining is comprehensive. It's coming from everywhere at once. There's no safe corner to hide in, no direction where you can escape.

But notice who's in control. Angels are holding back these winds. God's messengers have their hands on the forces of destruction. The winds can't blow until God says they can blow. Chaos doesn't get to run wild. Judgment doesn't happen by accident.

This connects to something Jesus said in Matthew 24:31:

Matthew 24:31 ESV

³¹ And he will send out his angels with a loud trumpet call, and they will gather his elect from the four winds, from one end of heaven to the other.

The same four directions that bring judgment also become the gathering points for God's people.

B. The Command: Seal First, Then Destroy (vv. 2-3)

Then John sees another angel. This one is ascending from the rising of the sun, from the east. He carries the seal of the living God. And he shouts with a loud voice to the four angels who have been given power to harm the earth and sea.

His message is clear: "Do not harm the earth or the sea or the trees, until we have sealed the servants of our God on their foreheads."

The word "seal" here is the Greek word *sphragis*. Think of a king's signet ring pressed into hot wax. When that wax hardened, it created an unbreakable mark that showed three things: ownership, authenticity, and protection.

A sealed document belonged to the king who sealed it. The seal proved it was genuine, not a forgery. And the seal protected it from tampering. Anyone who broke a royal seal without permission faced the king's wrath.

That's what God does to His servants. He presses His seal into their foreheads. They belong to Him. They're authentic believers, not counterfeits. And they're protected by His authority.

Notice the word "servants" here. It's the Greek word *doulos*, which means slaves. Not hired employees who can quit when things get tough. Slaves who are owned completely by their master. This sounds harsh to our ears, but it's actually the most secure position possible. When you're God's slave, He takes full responsibility for your care and protection.

The location matters too. The forehead. This is where the high priest wore God's name in the Old Testament. Exodus 28:36-38 describes a golden plate worn on Aaron's forehead with the words "Holy to the Lord" engraved on it. God's people bear His name in the most visible place possible.

Exodus 28:36-38 ESV

³⁶ "You shall make a plate of pure gold and engrave on it, like the engraving of a signet, 'Holy to the LORD.' ³⁷ And you shall fasten it on the turban by a cord of blue. It shall be on the front of the turban. ³⁸ It shall be on Aaron's forehead, and Aaron shall bear any guilt from the holy things that the people of Israel consecrate as their holy gifts. It shall regularly be on his forehead, that they may be accepted before the LORD.

C. The Principle: God's Perfect Timing

Here's the principle we can't miss: the order matters. Seal first, then destroy. Protect first, then proceed with judgment.

God doesn't throw His people into the fire and hope they survive. He doesn't let judgment fall and then scramble to rescue the survivors. He secures His people before He acts.

This takes us back to the Old Testament. In <u>Ezekiel 9:4-6</u>, God tells an angel to go through Jerusalem and put a mark on the foreheads of those who grieve over the city's sins. Then He tells the destroying angels, "Begin at my sanctuary. But do not touch anyone who has the mark."

Same pattern. Mark first, then destroy. God's judgment is never random. It's never rushed. His people are secured before His wrath is released.

This should give us tremendous confidence. God isn't careless with His children. He doesn't forget about us when trouble comes. His timing is perfect, and His protection is sure.

The phrase "living God" is important here too. This isn't a dead idol that can't help anyone. This is the God who lives and acts. The God who sees and knows. The God who has the power to seal and the authority to command angels.

III. The Sealed Servants: Numbered and Known (7:4-8)

A. The Number: 144,000 (v. 4)

Revelation 7:4 ESV

⁴ And I heard the number of the sealed, 144,000, sealed from every tribe of the sons of Israel:

John hears the number of the sealed: 144,000. This number comes from taking 12,000 from each of the twelve tribes of Israel.

The math here tells a story. Twelve times twelve times one thousand. In biblical symbolism, twelve represents completeness and divine government. God chose twelve tribes for Israel. Jesus chose twelve apostles. The New Jerusalem has twelve gates and twelve foundations.

When you multiply twelve by twelve, you get 144. That's completeness squared. Then multiply by one thousand, which often represents vastness or an enormous number. Think of <u>Psalm 50:10</u>: "For every beast of the forest is mine, the cattle on a thousand hills."

The point isn't necessarily that there are exactly 144,000 people. The point is that God knows exactly who belongs to Him. He hasn't lost count. He doesn't have people falling through the cracks. His knowledge of His servants is complete and precise.

This should comfort us. In a world of seven billion people, it's easy to feel anonymous. But God doesn't deal with crowds. He deals with individuals. He knows your name. He knows your struggles. He knows exactly where you are and what you need.

B. The List: Twelve Tribes Reordered (vv. 5-8)

Revelation 7:5-8 ESV

⁵ 12,000 from the tribe of Judah were sealed, 12,000 from the tribe of Reuben, 12,000 from the tribe of Gad, ⁶ 12,000 from the tribe of Asher, 12,000 from the tribe of Naphtali, 12,000 from the tribe of Manasseh, ⁷ 12,000 from the tribe of Simeon, 12,000 from the tribe of Levi, 12,000 from the tribe of Issachar, ⁸ 12,000 from the tribe of Zebulun, 12,000 from the tribe of Joseph, 12,000 from the tribe of Benjamin were sealed.

Now comes the fascinating part. John lists the twelve tribes, but this isn't the usual order. Something significant is happening here.

If you know your Old Testament, you'll notice several unusual things about this list.

1. What's Different from Traditional Lists

Judah is listed first. Normally, Reuben comes first because he was Jacob's firstborn son. You see this in the census lists in <u>Numbers 1</u> and 26. Reuben gets the honor of being mentioned first because of his birth order.

But not here. Judah takes the lead position. Why? Because Judah is the tribe of the Messiah. <u>Genesis 49:10</u> says, "The scepter shall not depart from Judah, nor the ruler's staff from between his feet, until tribute comes to him; and to him shall be the obedience of the peoples." Jesus came from the tribe of Judah. In <u>Revelation 5:5</u>, Jesus is called "the Lion of the tribe of Judah."

When God makes a list of His sealed people, He puts the Messiah's tribe first. This isn't about genealogy anymore. It's about theology. It's about who Jesus is and what He's accomplished.

Dan is completely missing. This is shocking. Dan was one of the twelve sons of Jacob. He had a legitimate place among the tribes. But he's not on this list at all.

Why would Dan be omitted? Throughout the Old Testament, Dan became associated with idolatry. In <u>Judges 18:30</u>, we read about the Danites setting up a carved image and worshipping it. When Jeroboam divided the kingdom and set up golden calves, one was placed in Dan (<u>1 Kings 12:29-30</u>).

By the time of the exile, Dan had become a symbol of departure from the true worship of God. Some Jewish traditions even suggested that the Antichrist would come from the tribe of Dan, based on Genesis 49:17 where Jacob calls Dan "a serpent in the way."

Levi is included. This is unusual because in most tribal lists related to land inheritance, Levi is excluded. The Levites received no territorial inheritance because they were set apart for

priestly service. Instead of land, they received cities scattered throughout the other tribes' territories.

But here, Levi gets a full place at the table. The priestly tribe is numbered among the sealed. This suggests that in God's final people, the distinction between priests and non-priests disappears. All of God's people become a kingdom of priests, as we see in <u>Revelation 1:6</u> and <u>1</u> Peter 2:9.

Joseph is listed along with Manasseh. Normally, you'd see either Joseph or his two sons, Ephraim and Manasseh. Jacob adopted these two grandsons as his own sons in <u>Genesis 48:5</u>: "And now your two sons, who were born to you in the land of Egypt before I came to you in Egypt, are mine; Ephraim and Manasseh shall be mine, as Reuben and Simeon are."

Usually, tribal lists include both Ephraim and Manasseh, or they include Joseph as representing both. Here, we see Joseph listed separately along with Manasseh. Where's Ephraim?

Most likely, Ephraim is represented under "Joseph." This maintains the twelve-tribe structure while honoring the patriarch Joseph himself. It's another sign that this list is making theological points, not just recording genealogy.

2. The Theological Message

These changes aren't accidents. They're deliberate choices that teach us something about God's character and His plan.

Christ comes first. By putting Judah at the head of the list, God emphasizes that Jesus is central to everything. The sealed people aren't saved by their tribal membership. They're saved by the Lion of Judah who became the Lamb of God.

Idolatry disqualifies. Dan's absence warns us that religious heritage means nothing if you abandon the true God. Being born into a believing family doesn't automatically seal you. Having Christian parents doesn't guarantee your salvation. What matters is your personal faithfulness to God.

Priestly service includes everyone. Levi's inclusion shows that all of God's people are called to serve Him. We're all priests now. We all have direct access to God through Christ. We all have the privilege and responsibility of offering spiritual sacrifices.

Grace restores what sin damaged. The careful arrangement of the remaining tribes shows God's ability to work around human failure. Dan's idolatry created a gap, but God filled it.

Joseph's complicated family situation got sorted out. God's plan moves forward even when His people stumble.

This list is really a snapshot of the gospel. Christ exalted, sin judged, service restored, grace triumphant. It's not just a roll call. It's a declaration of what God does for His people.

C. Two Main Interpretations

Now we come to a question that faithful Christians have debated for centuries: Who exactly are the 144,000? Are they literal Jewish believers, or do they represent the church as a whole?

Let me present both views fairly, because godly Bible scholars have come down on both sides of this question.

1. Symbolic View: The Complete Church

Many Christians believe the 144,000 represents the entire church, both Jews and Gentiles who have trusted in Christ.

Here's their reasoning:

The New Testament redefines who Israel is. Paul makes this point repeatedly. In <u>Romans 2:28-29</u>, he writes, "For no one is a Jew who is merely one outwardly, nor is circumcision outwardly and physical. But a Jew is one inwardly, and circumcision is a matter of the heart, by the Spirit, not by the letter."

In <u>Romans 9:6</u>, Paul says, "But it is not as though the word of God has failed. For not all who are descended from Israel belong to Israel." Physical descent from Abraham doesn't make you part of God's true people.

<u>Galatians 3:7</u> and 29 put it even more clearly: "Know then that it is those of faith who are the sons of Abraham... And if you are Christ's, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to promise."

Paul even calls the church "the Israel of God" in <u>Galatians 6:16</u>. So when Revelation talks about the tribes of Israel, it could mean all believers, not just ethnic Jews.

Revelation uses symbolic numbers throughout. We have seven churches, seven seals, seven trumpets, seven bowls. The number seven appears over 50 times in Revelation. Clearly, John is using numbers to convey spiritual truth, not just count things.

The number 1000 often represents completeness or vastness in Scripture. <u>Psalm 50:10</u> says God owns "the cattle on a thousand hills." Does that mean God doesn't own the cattle on the 1001st hill? Of course not. It means God owns all the cattle.

So 144,000 (twelve times twelve times one thousand) could represent the complete number of God's people from all backgrounds.

The tribal list changes suggest symbolism. We just saw how the list differs from traditional genealogies. Judah first, Dan missing, Levi included. These changes show that John is making theological points, not recording literal tribal membership.

Plus, no one today can prove their tribal lineage. The genealogical records were destroyed when the Romans destroyed the temple in AD 70. How could God seal exactly 12,000 from each tribe if no one knows which tribe they belong to?

The church is already called a priesthood. <u>First Peter 2:9</u> says believers are "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession." We're already God's temple (<u>1 Corinthians 3:16</u>), and we already serve Him as priests (<u>Revelation 1:6</u>).

This view says the 144,000 represents the church on earth, sealed for protection as they witness in a hostile world.

2. Literal View: Jewish Believers in End Times

Other faithful Christians believe the 144,000 are literally Jewish people who will come to faith in Christ during the end times.

Here's their reasoning:

The text uses specific tribal names and numbers. John doesn't just say "a complete number from spiritual Israel." He gives us precise details: 12,000 from Judah, 12,000 from Reuben, and so on. When Scripture means "all believers," it usually uses inclusive language like we see in <u>Galatians 3:28</u>: "There is neither Jew nor Greek."

The specificity here suggests literal meaning.

They're distinct from the great multitude. Right after the 144,000, John sees a different group in verses 9-17. This great multitude comes from "every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages." They're innumerable, while the 144,000 are precisely counted. They come from all nations, while the 144,000 come from Israel's tribes.

If both groups represent the same people, why describe them so differently? The natural reading suggests two distinct groups in God's end-time plan.

Romans 11 promises a future for Israel. Paul writes in Romans 11:25-26, "A partial hardening has come upon Israel, until the fullness of the Gentiles has come in. And in this way all Israel will be saved." He also says in verses 28-29, "As regards the gospel, they are enemies for your sake. But as regards election, they are beloved for the sake of their forefathers. For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable."

This suggests that God still has plans for ethnic Israel as a people, not just individual Jewish believers.

God made promises to Israel that still stand. <u>Jeremiah 31:35-37</u> ties God's covenant with Israel to the permanence of creation itself. <u>Ezekiel 36-37</u> speaks of Israel's restoration in ways that haven't been completely fulfilled yet.

Zechariah 12:10 prophesies, "And I will pour out on the house of David and the inhabitants of Jerusalem a spirit of grace and pleas for mercy, so that, when they look on me, on him whom they have pierced, they shall mourn for him."

<u>Revelation 14</u> gives more details about the 144,000. When they appear again in chapter 14, they have specific characteristics that suggest a distinct group, not all believers. They're called "firstfruits to God and to the Lamb," which implies they're part of a larger harvest, not the whole harvest.

This view usually sees the 144,000 as Jewish evangelists who will lead a great worldwide revival during the tribulation period.

3. Common Ground

Here's what both views agree on, and this is what matters most for our daily Christian living:

God knows His people completely. Whether it's 144,000 Jewish believers or the complete church represented symbolically, God hasn't lost count. He knows exactly who belongs to Him.

Divine sealing provides unshakeable security. The seal protects God's people through judgment and trial. It can't be lost, stolen, or worn away.

The sealed can stand when others cannot. This answers the question from chapter 6. While the world runs and hides, God's people can stand confidently in His presence.

Both views lead to the same applications. Assurance for believers, urgency for evangelism, faithfulness in trials, and hope for the future.

I want to present both views to you because faithful Christians disagree on this point. What matters more than settling the debate is receiving the comfort both interpretations provide.

Whether you see yourself represented directly in the 144,000 or see them as your Jewish brothers and sisters who will join you in heaven, the message is the same: God seals His servants before judgment falls. You can stand because you bear His mark.

IV. The Meaning of the Seal: What This Means for Us

Now that we've seen who gets sealed and how many are sealed, we need to understand what the seal actually does. What does it mean to be sealed by God? How does this ancient image apply to your life today?

The Greek word *sphragis* gives us three powerful truths about what God's seal means for every believer.

A. Ownership: You Belong to God

When a king pressed his signet ring into wax, the first thing that seal communicated was ownership. This document belongs to the king. This letter comes from the royal court. This decree carries the monarch's authority.

God's seal on your forehead declares the same thing: you belong to Him. You're not a spiritual free agent anymore. You're not trying to make it on your own. The living God has claimed you as His personal property.

This might sound uncomfortable to our independence-loving ears, but it's actually the most liberating truth in the universe. When God owns you, He takes full responsibility for you.

Think about it this way. If you own a car, you don't let it sit in the driveway with a flat tire. You fix it. You don't let it run out of gas on the highway. You fill the tank. You maintain what belongs to you because it's yours.

God maintains His people the same way. He doesn't seal you and then abandon you. He doesn't mark you as His and then forget about you. Ownership means ongoing care.

Paul explains this in <u>Ephesians 1:13-14</u>: "In him you also, when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and believed in him, were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit,

who is the guarantee of our inheritance until we acquire possession of it, to the praise of his glory."

The Holy Spirit is God's seal on your life. He's the down payment on your eternal inheritance. He's God's guarantee that He will complete what He started in you as you remain faithful to Him.

When you feel forgotten or abandoned, remember the seal. You belong to God. He's committed to caring for those who continue to trust in Him.

This also means you're not your own anymore. <u>First Corinthians 6:19-20</u> says, "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body."

The seal changes how you live. You don't make decisions based only on what you want. You consider what honors the One who owns you. Your time belongs to Him. Your talents belong to Him.

But here's the beautiful part: the God who owns you loves you more than you love yourself. His plans for you are better than your plans for you. His ownership isn't tyranny. It's the most loving care imaginable.

B. Authenticity: You Are Genuine

A royal seal also proved authenticity. It distinguished genuine documents from forgeries. If you received a letter with the king's seal, you knew it was really from the king, not from some imposter.

God's seal proves you're a genuine believer, not a counterfeit Christian.

This world is full of religious fakes. Jesus warned about this in <u>Matthew 7:21-23</u>: "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name?' And then will I declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you workers of lawlessness.'"

Scary words. People who look religious. People who do religious things. People who use religious language. But Jesus calls them counterfeits because they don't have His seal.

How do you know if your faith is authentic? The Holy Spirit bears witness with your spirit that you are a child of God (Romans 8:16). The same Spirit who seals you also confirms that the sealing is real.

But authentic faith shows itself in authentic living. <u>First John 2:3-4</u> says, "And by this we know that we have come to know him, if we keep his commandments. Whoever says 'I know him' but does not keep his commandments is a liar, and the truth is not in him."

The seal doesn't just declare that you're genuine. It makes you genuine. The Holy Spirit transforms you from the inside out. He produces His fruit in your life: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (<u>Galatians 5:22-23</u>).

This should give you great confidence. If you're truly trusting in Christ, if the Spirit is working in your life, if you're growing in godliness, then you bear God's authentic seal. You're not a fake. You're the real thing.

But it should also make you examine yourself. <u>Second Corinthians 13:5</u> says, "Examine yourselves, to see whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves. Or do you not realize this about yourselves, that Jesus Christ is in you—unless indeed you fail to meet the test!"

Do you see the Spirit's fruit in your life? Do you love what God loves and hate what God hates? Are you growing in holiness? The seal produces authentic spiritual life.

C. Protection: You Are Secure

The third function of a royal seal was protection. Breaking someone's seal without permission was a serious crime. It meant facing the king's wrath.

Remember Daniel in the lions' den? <u>Daniel 6:17</u> says, "And a stone was brought and laid on the mouth of the den, and the king sealed it with his own signet and with the signet of his lords, that nothing might be changed concerning Daniel."

That seal was meant to protect Daniel from anyone who might try to rescue him illegally. But God's power proved greater than any human seal. The same God who protected Daniel protects everyone who bears His seal and remains faithful to Him.

But we need to be careful here. God's seal doesn't protect you from all suffering. It protects you through suffering. The 144,000 aren't sealed to avoid tribulation. They're sealed to endure tribulation.

Look at the context again. These servants are sealed so they can survive what's coming. They're protected so they can witness in a hostile world. They're marked so they won't be destroyed when judgment falls.

This connects to Paul's teaching in <u>Ephesians 4:30</u>: "And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, by whom you were sealed for the day of redemption." The seal guarantees your final deliverance as you continue in faith and faithfulness.

Think about the Passover in <u>Exodus 12</u>. The blood on the doorposts didn't protect the Israelites from hearing the sounds of judgment outside. It didn't spare them from the terror of that night. But it protected them from the destroyer who passed through Egypt.

God's seal works the same way. You might go through cancer, but the cancer can't touch your soul as long as you hold fast to Christ. You might face financial ruin, but that can't bankrupt your eternal inheritance if you remain faithful. You might experience persecution, but that can't separate you from God's love as long as you don't give up.

Jesus promised this in <u>John 10:27-29</u>: "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all, and no one is able to snatch them out of the Father's hand."

The seal represents God's faithful protection of those who continue to follow Him.

This doesn't make you careless with your spiritual life. It makes you confident in your spiritual battle. You can stand against temptation because you know who you belong to. You can face trials because you know who protects you. You can witness boldly because you know God's faithfulness to those who remain faithful.

The hospital wristband illustration works here too. When you're unconscious in the emergency room, that wristband ensures you get the right treatment. The medical staff knows who you are and what you need because of that identifying mark.

God's seal works even when you're spiritually weak. Even when you're too overwhelmed to pray clearly, too confused to think straight, too exhausted to feel God's presence, the seal still identifies you as His. The Great Physician knows exactly who you are and what you need.

Your protection doesn't depend on your perfect performance. It depends on God's faithful character.

V. Practical Applications: Living as Sealed People

Understanding what the seal means is one thing. Living like sealed people is another. Let's talk about how this truth should change our daily lives.

A. Assurance in Chaos

We live in a world that feels like it's coming apart. Wars and rumors of wars. Economic uncertainty. Political division. Natural disasters. Personal crises. It's easy to feel like everything is spinning out of control.

But here's what sealed people remember: when your world shakes, your seal doesn't.

Look around at the people hiding in caves in <u>Revelation 6</u>. They're terrified because they have no protection. They're calling for rocks to fall on them because they'd rather be crushed than face God's judgment. They have no assurance, no security, no hope.

You're different. You bear God's unbreakable mark. The same judgment that terrifies the unsealed can't touch what matters most about you. Your soul is secure. Your eternity is settled. Your relationship with God is guaranteed.

This doesn't mean you won't face hard times. It means hard times can't destroy what God has sealed. Financial collapse might threaten your savings, but it can't bankrupt your heavenly inheritance. Persecution might cost you earthly comfort, but it can't separate you from God's love.

David understood this. In <u>Psalm 46:1-3</u>, he wrote, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear though the earth gives way, though the mountains be moved into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble at its swelling."

David could say this because he knew God's protective power.

God knows who you are, where you are, and what you need. He won't lose track of you in the chaos.

B. Holiness in Compromise

Sealed people live differently than unsealed people.

In ancient times, slaves often bore their master's mark. It identified who they belonged to and reminded them how to behave. If you were Caesar's slave, you represented Caesar wherever you went. If you dishonored yourself, you dishonored him.

You bear a greater mark than any earthly master's. You belong to the King of kings. You represent Him wherever you go. The choices you make reflect on the One who sealed you.

This should make you think carefully about your entertainment choices. Does what you watch honor the One whose name you bear? It should influence your speech. Do your words reflect the character of your Master? It should guide your relationships. Do your friendships and your romantic choices align with God's standards?

Paul understood this connection between sealing and holy living. In <u>Ephesians 4:30</u>, he writes, "And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, by whom you were sealed for the day of redemption." Then he immediately talks about putting away bitterness, anger, malice, and unwholesome talk.

The seal isn't just a ticket to heaven. It's a call to holiness. You're marked as God's special possession, set apart for His purposes.

But here's the encouraging part: the same Spirit who seals you also empowers you to live differently. You're not trying to be holy in your own strength. The seal comes with supernatural help.

When temptation comes, remember your seal. You don't belong to sin anymore. When peer pressure mounts, remember your seal. You don't need human approval when you have the Lord's acceptance. When compromise looks attractive, remember your seal. You represent the holy God who marked you as His own.

This isn't legalism. It's love. You live differently because you belong to Someone who loves you enough to die for you. You pursue holiness because holiness leads to the happiness God designed you for.

C. Courage for Witness

The 144,000 aren't sealed so they can hide in Christian bunkers until Jesus comes back. They're sealed so they can witness in a hostile world. The seal provides protection for proclamation.

Think about the original context. These servants are sealed right before the trumpet judgments fall. The world is about to become more hostile to God and His people. But God's people are equipped to stand and speak truth in that environment.

The seal should give you courage to share your faith. This doesn't mean witnessing is easy. It means witnessing is protected. God won't abandon you when you speak for Him. He'll provide what you need when you need it.

Jesus promised this in <u>Matthew 10:19-20</u>: "When they deliver you over, do not be anxious how you are to speak or what you are to say, for what you are to say will be given to you in that hour. For it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you."

The same Spirit who seals you also speaks through you. You're not witnessing alone. You're witnessing with divine backup.

Look for opportunities this week to share what Christ means to you. Start conversations about spiritual things. Invite people to church. Tell someone how God has worked in your life.

D. Comfort for Sufferers

Some of you are going through really hard times right now. Maybe you're dealing with health problems, relationship struggles, financial stress, or family conflicts. You might be wondering if God has forgotten about you.

The seal says He hasn't.

Suffering doesn't cancel your sealing. Pain doesn't prove you're not protected. Trials don't mean God has abandoned you.

Look at the context again. The 144,000 are sealed before tribulation, not instead of tribulation. They're marked so they can endure what's coming, not escape what's coming.

Job understood this. Even in his worst suffering, he declared, "I know that my Redeemer lives, and at the last he will stand upon the earth. And after my skin has been thus destroyed, yet in my flesh I shall see God" (<u>Job 19:25-26</u>).

Paul learned the same lesson. In <u>2 Corinthians 1:21-22</u>, he writes, "And it is God who establishes us with you in Christ, and has anointed us, and who has also put his seal on us and given us his Spirit in our hearts as a guarantee."

Paul wrote those words while facing persecution, imprisonment, and physical hardship. But he could talk about God's seal and guarantee because those realities transcended his immediate circumstances.

Your current suffering is real, but it's not final. Your present pain is intense, but it's not permanent. The seal guarantees that your story doesn't end with sorrow. God will wipe away every tear, heal every hurt, and restore every loss for those who remain faithful to Him.

When suffering tempts you to doubt God's love, look at the cross. The same Jesus who died for you is the one who seals you. If He loved you enough to save you, He loves you enough to sustain you.

When pain makes you question God's plan, remember the seal. God hasn't lost track of you. He knows exactly where you are and what you're going through. He's working all things together for good for those who love Him and remain committed to His calling.

The seal doesn't promise easy living, but it does promise eternal hope. And sometimes, that hope is exactly what you need to take the next step forward.

VI. Conclusion: The Answer to "Who Can Stand?"

A. The Question Answered

Do you remember how we started today? We came from the terror of <u>Revelation 6</u>, where creation itself was convulsing under God's judgment. We heard kings and generals, the rich and the powerful, slaves and free people all crying out in desperation: "Who can stand in the great day of their wrath?"

The question hung in the air like a death sentence. It seemed like the answer was nobody. No one could stand. Everyone was running, hiding, begging for rocks to crush them rather than face the Lamb's wrath.

But today we discovered God's answer. The sealed servants of God can stand. Not because they're stronger than everyone else. Not because they're better people. Not because they've earned God's favor through good works.

They can stand because they bear God's seal.

The same chaos that sends others running to caves finds God's people standing confidently. The same judgment that terrifies the world becomes the moment when God's protection

shines brightest. The same Lamb whose wrath drives people to despair is the Lamb whose blood covers His sealed servants.

You can stand because you're owned by God, authenticated by God, and protected by God.

B. How to Receive the Seal

Maybe you're sitting here today and you realize you don't have this seal. You've never been marked by God as His own. You're not sure you could stand if judgment came tomorrow.

The seal isn't earned by good works or religious activity. It's received by faith in Jesus Christ alone.

<u>Romans 10:9</u> makes it simple: "If you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved."

The moment you truly trust in Christ, God seals you with His Holy Spirit. <u>Ephesians 1:13</u> promises this: "In him you also, when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and believed in him, were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit."

You don't have to clean up your life first. You don't have to prove you're worthy. You just have to come to Christ as you are and trust Him to save you. He'll do the cleaning up. He'll provide the worthiness. He'll apply the seal.

If you've never done this, don't wait for a more convenient time. Don't assume you have years to decide. Today is the day of salvation.

C. Preview of Next Week

But the story doesn't end with sealing. Next week, we're going to see what happens to sealed people. We're going to witness one of the most beautiful scenes in all of Scripture.

From the numbered on earth, we'll see the innumerable in heaven. From 144,000 sealed servants, we'll discover a great multitude that no one can count. From every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages.

We'll hear them singing songs of salvation. We'll see them waving palm branches in victory. We'll discover that they've come out of great tribulation, and their robes have been washed white in the Lamb's blood.

And we'll learn about the Shepherd-Lamb who guides them to springs of living water and wipes away every tear from their eyes.

The seal guarantees your protection through trials. But the vision we'll see next week shows you where that protection leads.

The people who can stand don't just survive. They overcome. They don't just endure. They celebrate. And the celebration lasts forever.
