Activity

You've Got Skills

What You Need:

Supplies for something your child is good at (video games, drawing, dancing, stuffed animal arrangements, etc.)

What You Do:

Ask your child to teach you how to do something they're good at. If they don't feel like they're especially good at anything, help them figure out what they can do—even if they're still learning. Maybe set up a regular time for the rest of the month for you to let them teach you, giving them the chance to be the expert!

Talk About the Bible Story

In our story today, what was Lydia good at? (Making fine purple cloth, helping others)

What are YOU good at? What do you want to get better at?

How can you use your skills and gifts to help others?

Explain to your child that God made them the way they are on purpose, for HIS purpose. God can use them—even now, when they're young.


Extra credit if you can find a way to help your child use their skills and talents to help someone else this week!

Read Ephesians 2:10

Read Matthew 5:14-16

Have you ever hunted for spiders at night?

With an adult's permission, grab a flashlight after dark and head outside. Turn on the flashlight and hold it up to the side of your head, level with your eyes. Then look carefully at the grass or flower beds. You should begin to spot some tiny, bright pinpoints of light. Some of these might be drops of water on the grass but if you look closely, you may be surprised at how many spiders you spot!

Spiders sparkle because of a shiny layer behind their eyes called a tapetum. This makes things look much brighter. God's creativity is amazing, isn't it?

Did you know you have the ability to shine like a spider? No, that doesn't mean your eyes glow in the dark! Every time you help, or listen, or encourage, or love others, it's like shining bright light to point others to God. God is counting on you to use the uniquely individual and amazing way He's made you to help others.
