# SUMMARY

**M**arch 2020, the global Covid-19 pandemic struck the world. Virtually everyone was affected in the most fundamental aspects of daily life. Church families, ChangePoint included, were massively disrupted. Every aspect of Christian communal experience—from Sunday services to small groups—was impacted. Over the past two-and-a-half years, churches have struggled to figure out how to follow Jesus and advance the gospel during a global pandemic.

Our church family faced some unique challenges in this season. When Covid hit, we had just planted three campuses, were in the middle of our three-year Promised Land Initiative capital campaign, and had just learned that Joel Engle, our primary preacher, was leaving. The sustainability of all our campuses and ministries was suddenly in question.

If there is one thing we have learned over the past 30 months, it is that **God is faithful!** Looking back, we can clearly see how He generously provided for and sustained our church family and our ministries. Moreover, in a time of contraction, God miraculously expanded our ability to advance the gospel! Amid Covid, we purchased new ministry facilities in Mat-Su and Kotzebue, planted a “ChangePoint Outpost” in the village of Marshall, and established strategic partnerships with over a dozen Alaskan and national churches and ministries. And we watched God work powerfully in our church family. We especially rejoice in the spiritual life and energy He birthed in our students—from Kotzebue to Anchorage!

One of the biggest gifts from God in this season has been the strength of the vision He gave us 20 years ago to bring **Life in Christ to Every Alaskan and the World Beyond**. That vision has helped us stay the course through the challenges and uncertainties of Covid, it has directed our priorities and our decisions, and it is guiding our next steps. We are tremendously excited by the spiritual vitality we see across all our campuses!

God has led us to take bold steps toward our vision in the 2022-23 ministry year. Many new members have joined our church since Covid hit. Our prayer is that everyone would “Join the Adventure” as we move forward into what God has for us next.

# PROMISED LAND INITIATIVE

AFTER A SEASON OF “VISION PRAYER,” IN 2018 IT WAS TIME TO “LIFT OUR EYES” AGAIN AND TAKE OUR NEXT BIG STEP IN PURSUIT OF OUR VISION.

THE PROMISED LAND INITIATIVE HAD TWO KEY COMPONENTS:

GENERATIONAL	GEOGRAPHIC
<p>Our student space was a double-wide hallway on the second floor of the Raspberry campus that significantly limited the types of meetings and events our students could have and created challenges with engaging new students.</p> <p>The Promised Land Initiative funded the construction of a Student Center on the ground floor of the Raspberry campus that gave our students a quality space to gather right by the front door.</p>	<p>After asking God to show us how to step toward our vision of reaching Every Alaskan, God directed us to plant additional campuses. The Promised Land Initiative funded new ChangePoint campuses across Alaska.</p> <p>We originally planned for a single campus plant, but God led us to plant in three locations in phase 1: Tikahtnu Commons in Northeast Anchorage, Wasilla in the Mat-Su Valley, and Kotzebue in Northwest Alaska.</p>

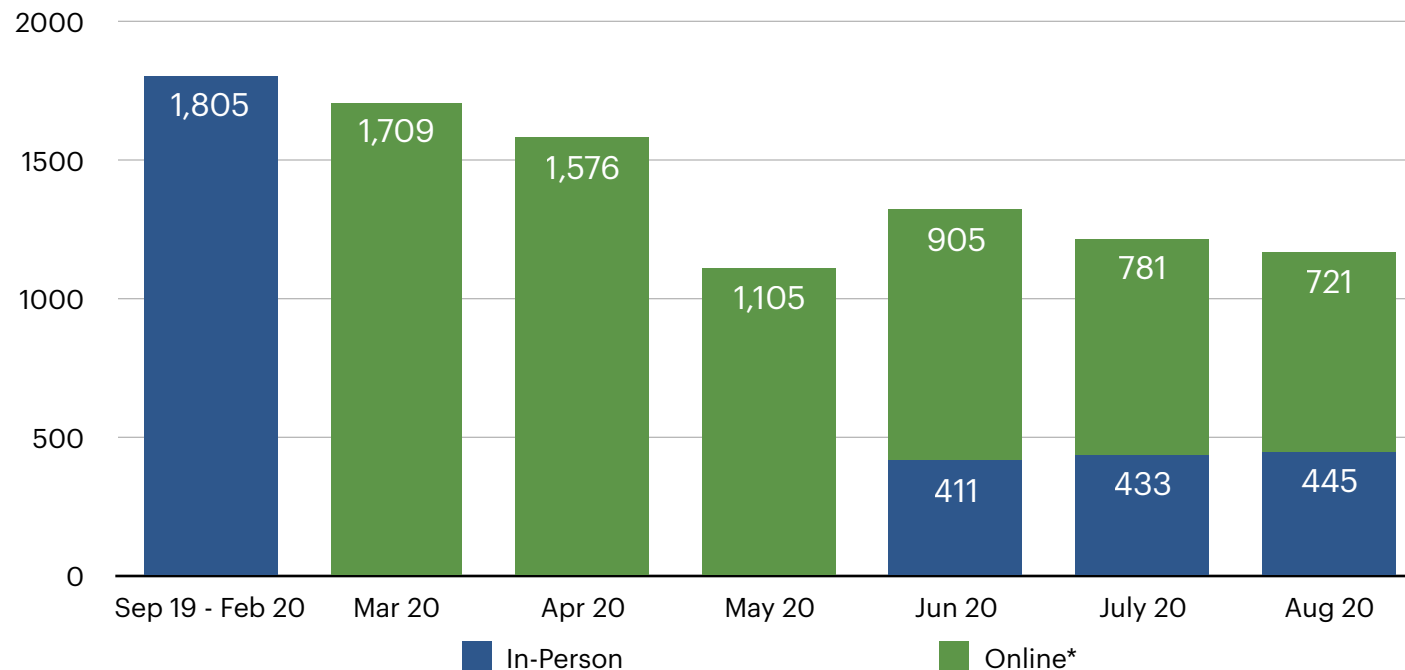

# THE PANDEMIC

## WE COULD NEVER HAVE IMAGINED WHAT GOD HAD IN STORE FOR OUR CHURCH IN MARCH OF 2020.

The sudden inability to gather in-person was a shock to our church family - one that continued for much longer than expected. But while churches nationwide struggled to stream their services online, we were ready week one. The infrastructure we had built for multi-campus ministry was immediately re-purposed for online streaming.

**Raspberry Attendance Sep 19 - Aug 20**



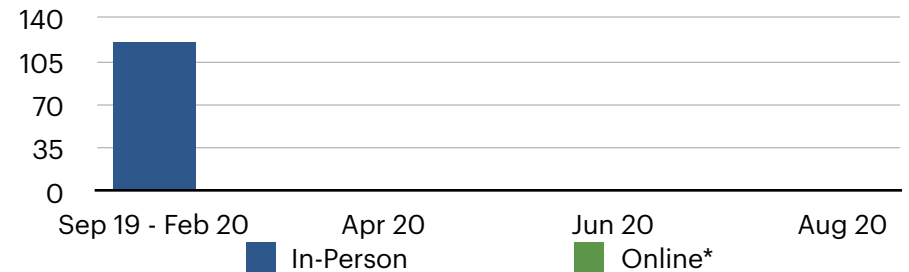

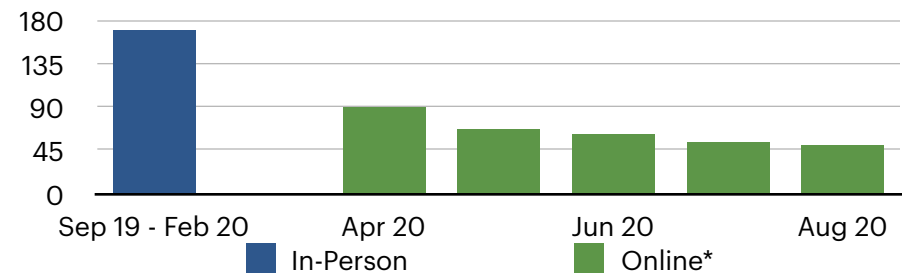
**Tikantnu Attendance Sep 19 - Aug 20**

ChangePoint Mat-Su also lost access to their meeting location at Colony Middle School. They streamed online over Zoom from a shop hangar on a church member's property.

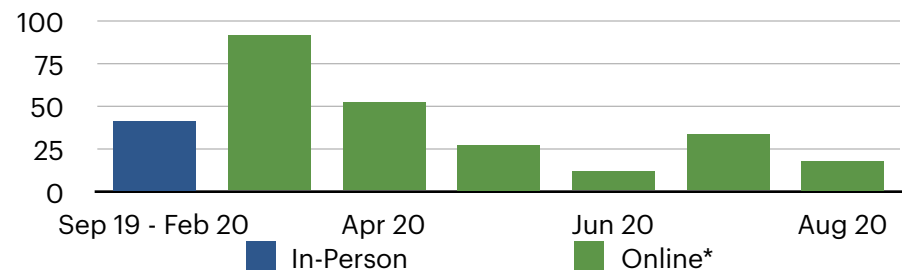
**Mat-Su Attendance Sep 19 - Aug 20**

**Kotzebue Attendance Sep 19 - Aug 20**

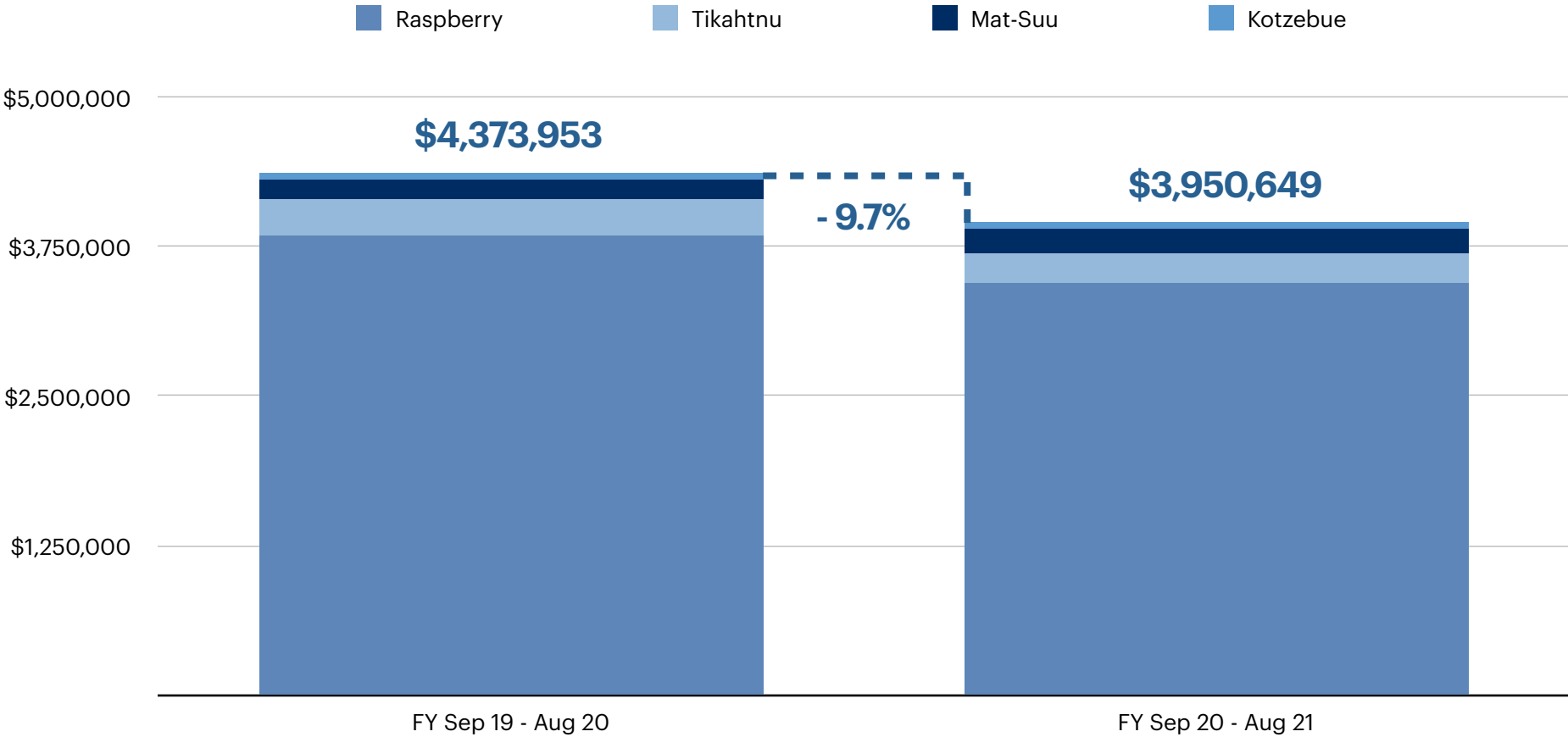

## THE PANDEMIC - OUR RESPONSE

The pandemic represented a special opportunity from God to love our neighbors in unique ways. Though our body life as a church was disrupted - the ministry outreach of our church was not.

### KEEPING PEOPLE CONNECTED

- We **called every person** who had interacted with the church in the past 2 years to check on them.
- Tikahtnu campus did **home visits** and drive-by visits throughout the pandemic.
- Mat-Su focused on **meeting practical needs** of people during the pandemic and the unprecedented wind storm.
- We met as a church online each evening to pray together through **Covid 19:00 Prayer**.
- We launched **Operation: Help** a website where believers could directly help each other with practical needs.
- **Easter 2020 over 14,000** joined us for worship online in that moment of crisis. The facilities crew built a replica of **Raspberry campus in Minecraft** for our CPKids.
- We learned to stream not only church services, but **funerals, weddings and other events**. We streamed **online graduation ceremonies** for the ASD and a **special baccalaureate service** for the class to 2020.
- We also **helped dozens of other churches** keep their communities connected, including Punto Luce church in Milan, Italy.

## THE PANDEMIC - OUR RESPONSE

### LEVERAGING THE RASPBERRY CAMPUS

- During the pandemic food insecurity rose as people were unable to shop or work. So we partnered with the Food Bank of Alaska to become their **South Anchorage Distribution Site**.
- We used our experience from AdventureLand to open a **study-hall program** for the children of essential workers who would otherwise have been home alone.
- We **offered our building to the municipality** who used it to train APD and other law enforcement.

- We hosted a **city Covid-19 testing** site throughout the pandemic. Our building is centrally located and our parking lot provides ample traffic-flow. Tens of thousands of Alaskans visited Raspberry for this reason.
- We hosted **drive-in movies** projected on the side of our building to give families something to do together and a safe way to see each other.

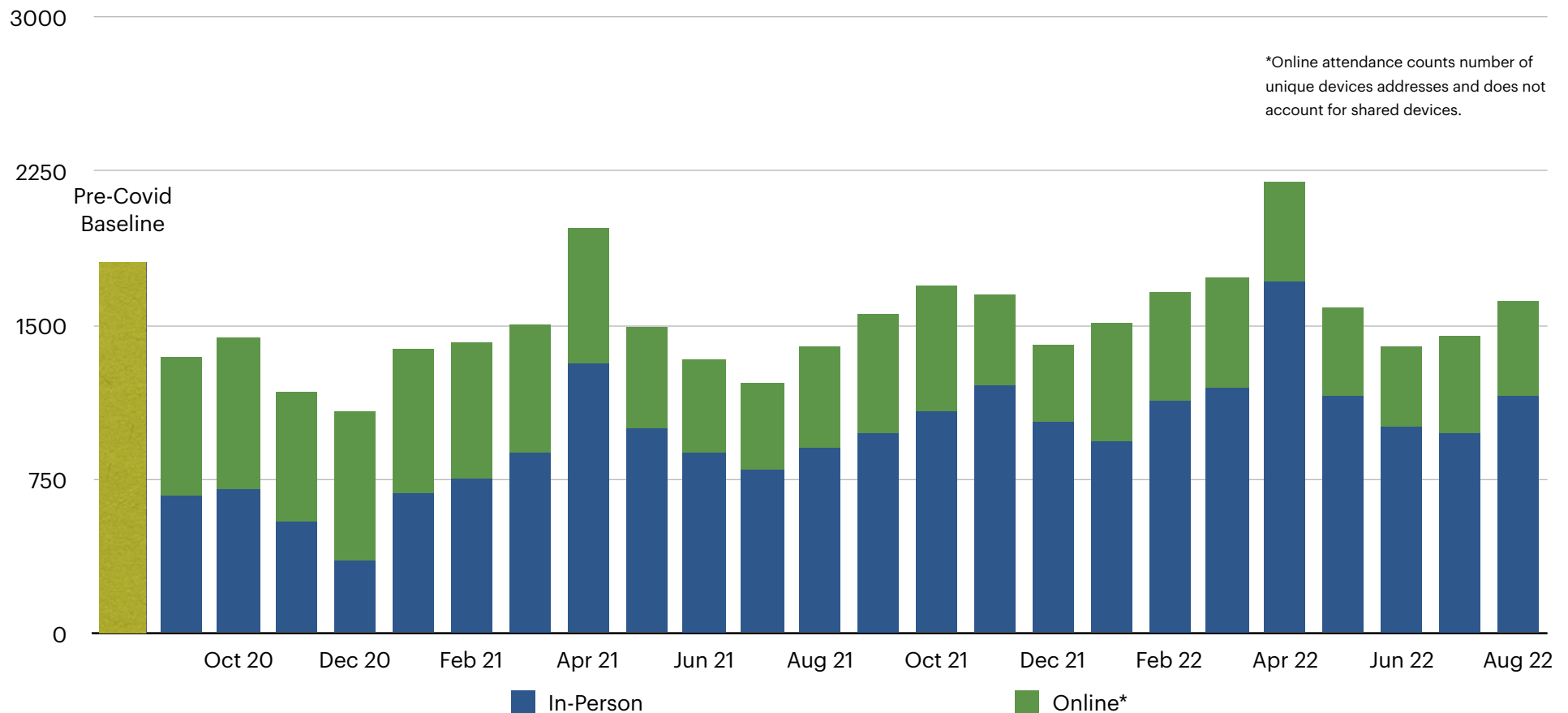

# GOD'S FAITHFULNESS

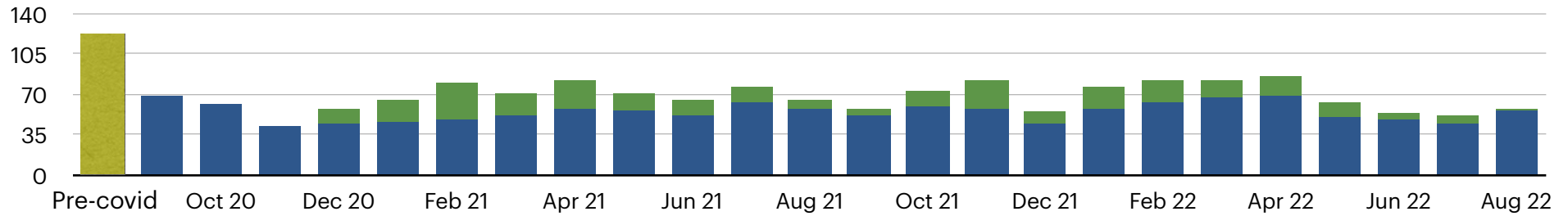
We have seen God's faithfulness to us as our ability to gather in-person has increased. The Mat-Su campus now enjoys larger in-person attendance than pre-covid.

## Raspberry Attendance Sep 20 - Aug 22

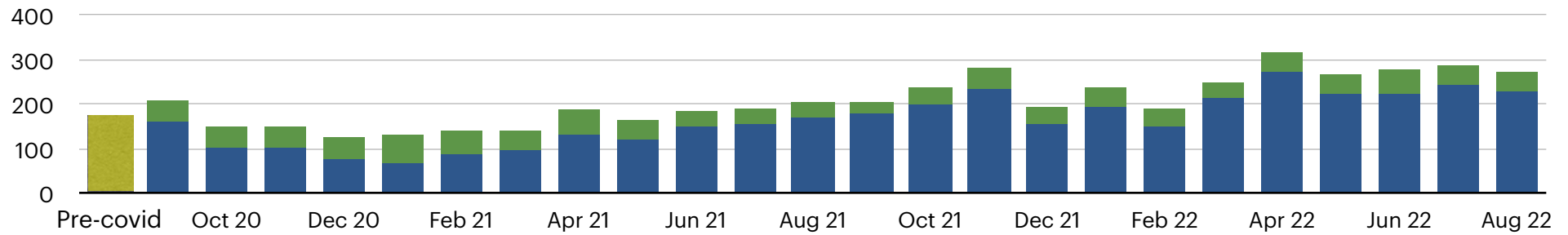

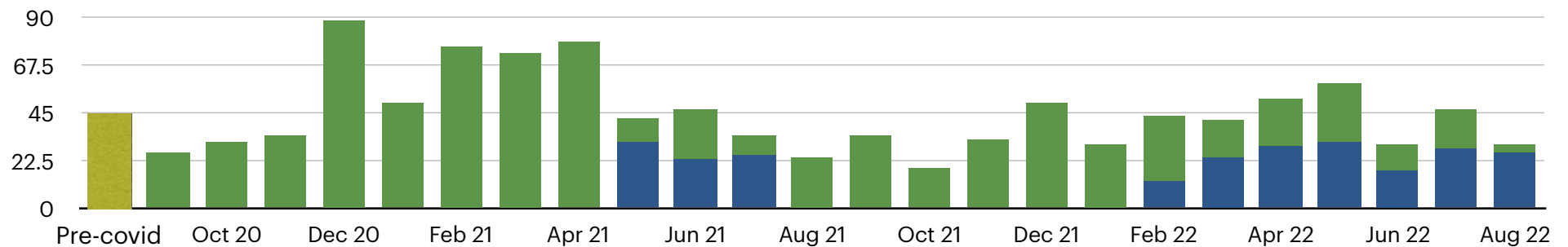
### Tikahtnu Attendance Sep 20 - Aug 22



### Mat-Su Attendance Sep 20 - Aug 22

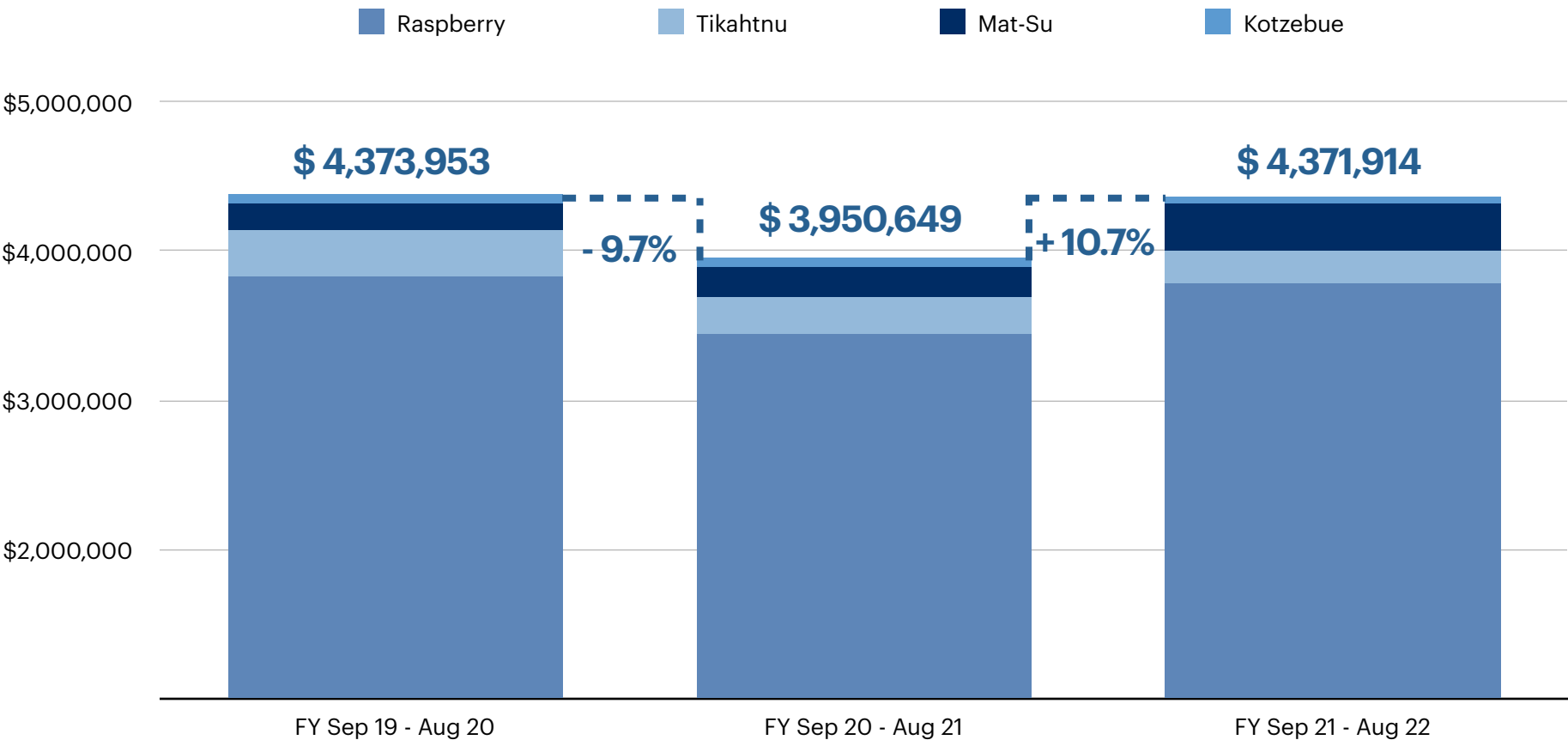


### Kotzebue Attendance Sep 20 - Aug 22



# GOD’S FAITHFULNESS - GENERAL GIVING

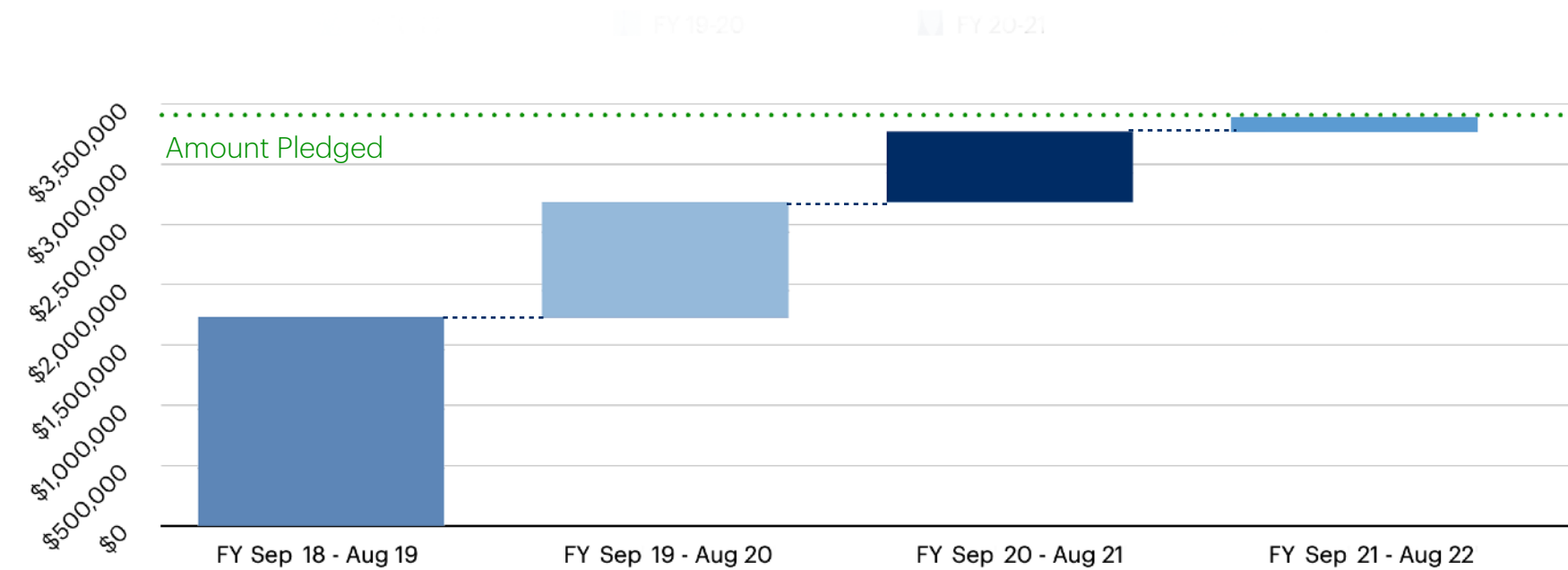
Our church family’s giving also powerfully demonstrates God’s faithfulness. The fiscal year that just ended saw us give as much as before covid.

### MAT-SU

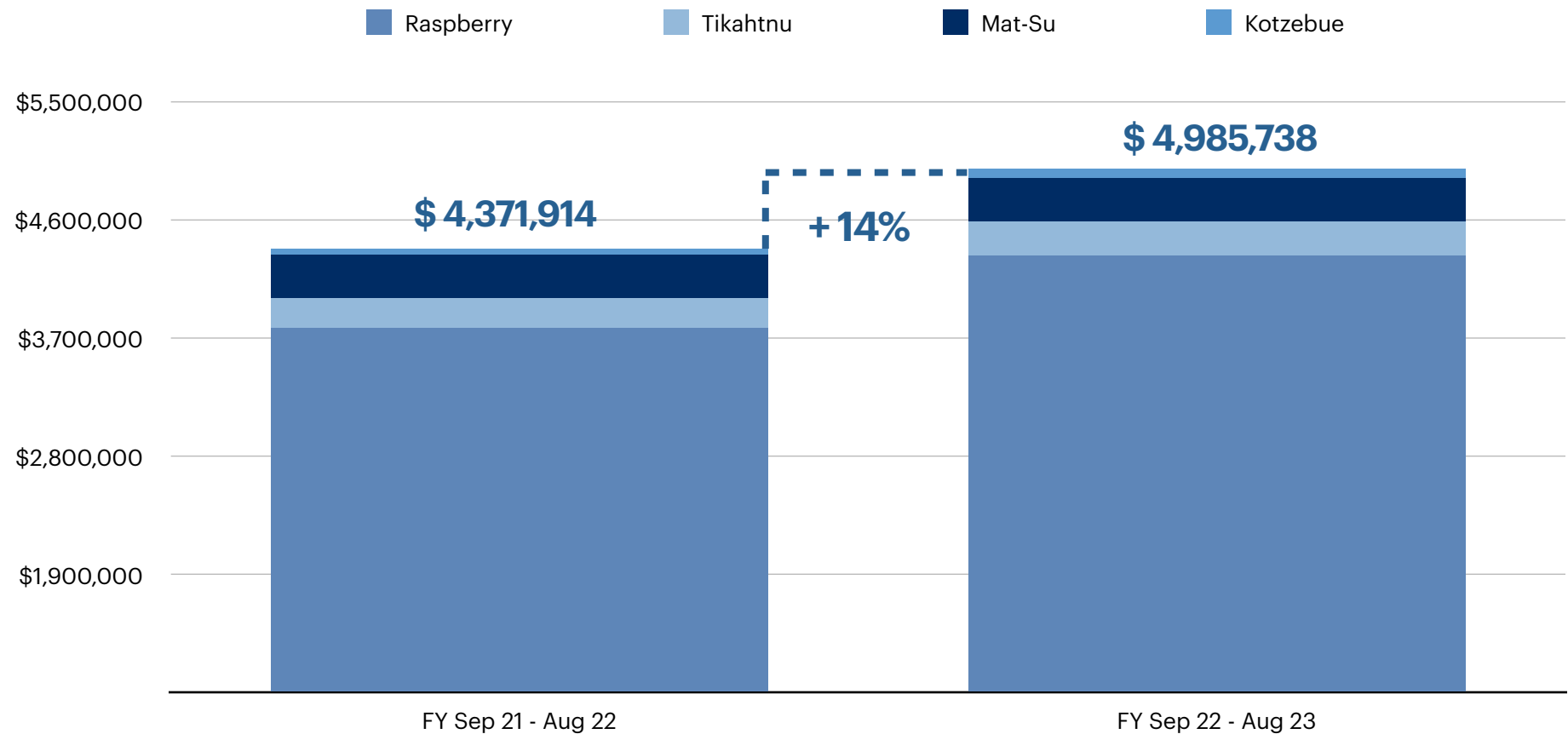
- Next stage of *Expanding for the Valley* Initiative.

## REQUIRED GIVING

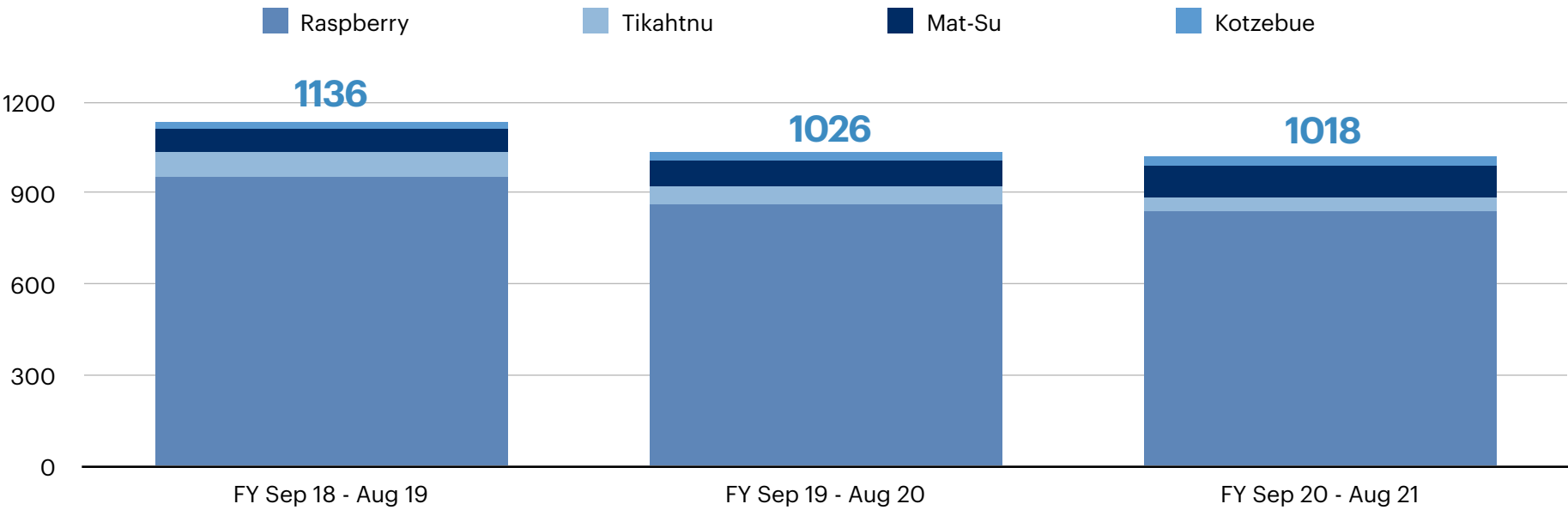
The ChangePoint Elder board believes God will grow our annual giving by 14% this year to fund the ministry advances He is leading us to take.
