

No Offense!

Proverbs 18:19; Proverbs 19:11 Matthew 18:15-20; Luke 17:1-4

The Bottom Line: Offense creates a fence that closes us off to one another.

Introduction:

Have you ever noticed that we only say "no offense" when we are in the middle of making a comment that is decidedly offensive?

The people around us are not only wildly offensive but they are very easily offended... especially Christians.

Jesus said that one of the signs of the last days would be a society consumed by offense (Matthew 24:10).

Truth:

In our passage today, Jesus shares some profound words regarding those who offend and those who are offended. Read Luke 17:1-4.					

Application & Conclusion:

Jesus calls us to forgive each other for freedom's sake. Jesus' radical kind of forgiveness that He prescribes is guaranteed to bring a radical kind of freedom. It sets both the offender free and the offended free. They are free to love. Free to serve one another. Free to move forward together at peace.

They insulted you. They spoke to you the wrong way. They threw you under the bus. They caused you heartache. How much more have we offended God? How much greater is His forgiveness toward all who repent?

Freedom and reconciliation are on the other side of forgiveness and kindness toward one another. As Paul the Apostle urges us, "Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you" (Ephesians 4:31-32).
