Four *pitfalls* to failure

Four wrong views of life

I am the gate; whoever enters through me will be saved. He will come in and go out, and find pasture. 10 The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full. (John 10:9-10 NIV)

"I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. (John 15:5 NIV)

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. 29 Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. 30 For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30 NIV)

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. (John 14:27 NIV)

The Philistines assembled to fight Israel, with three thousand chariots, six thousand charioteers, and soldiers as numerous as the sand on the seashore. They went up and camped at Micmash, east of Beth Aven. 6 When the men of Israel saw that their situation was critical and that their army was hard pressed, they hid in caves and thickets, among the rocks, and in pits and cisterns. 7 Some Hebrews even crossed the Jordan to the land of Gad and Gilead. Saul remained at Gilgal, and all the troops with him were quaking with fear. 8 He waited seven days, the time set by Samuel; but Samuel did not come to Gilgal, and Saul's men began to scatter. (1 Samuel 13:5-8 NIV)

1. Trusting in our plans rather than God's plans

This happens when we have a wrong view of *self*.

So he said, "Bring me the burnt offering and the fellowship offerings." And Saul offered up the burnt offering. 10 Just as he finished making the offering, Samuel arrived, and Saul went out to greet him. (1 Samuel 13:9-10 NIV)

"What have you done?" asked Samuel. Saul replied, "When I saw that the men were scattering, and that you did not come at the set time, and that the Philistines were assembling at Micmash, 12 I thought, 'Now the Philistines will come down against me at Gilgal, and I have not sought the Lord's favor.' So I felt compelled to offer the burnt offering." (1 Samuel 13:11-12 NIV)

"You acted foolishly," Samuel said. "You have not kept the command the Lord your God gave you; if you had, he would have established your kingdom over Israel for all time. 14 But now your kingdom will not endure; the Lord has sought out a man after his own heart and appointed him leader of his people, because you have not kept the Lord's command.". (1 Samuel 13:13-14 NIV)

We make choices and over a matter of time those choices *make us*.

C.S. Lewis wrote "good and evil both *increase* at compound interest."

"Watch your thoughts, they become <u>words</u>; watch your words, they become <u>actions</u>; watch your actions, they become <u>habits</u>; watch your habits, they become <u>character</u>; watch your character, for it becomes your <u>destiny</u>."

2. The second pitfall to failure is viewing God as someone who <u>serves</u> me, instead of me <u>serving</u> Him.

This comes when we have a wrong view of *God*.

11 "What have you done?" asked Samuel.

If you come to God simply for what He will do for you, you are headed for *failure*. You will never experience the abundant Christian life.
