## Questions from Psalms 19:7-11

- 1. If perfection is to be discovered, where can the believer find it? Answer vs. 1
- 2. Why is verse one the truth surrounding Psalms 19? Answer vs 2
- 3. Why is Gods law perfect? Answer verse 3
- 4. How can the Law of the Lord be pure?

The first verse of this Psalms strikes the keynote of the whole collection. There we learn that the hidden beauty of the Holy Scriptures can be discovered only by meditation.

What is the lesson of Psalm 19:7-11?

These five verses (7 - 11) bring together many of the attributes of the law of the Lord and the benefits of obeying this law. The law of the Lord is perfect, sure, right, pure, clean, true, righteous, more expensive than gold, and sweeter than honey.

The Law Outlines for us what pure and righteous living looks like.

In these verses, David says that the Law is "perfect," "sure," "right," "pure," "clean," "true," and "righteous altogether." If you want to know what God loves and what God hates, look to the Law.

We all need the Word of God to guide us through life. The man that tries to live outside of the wisdom of God is destine for a rude awakening. An awakening that challenges human precepts and concepts about God and the truth according to His Word.

When we read what is said here of the law or Word of God, it seem as if the writer who is David is acting as a poet in his description. It is a picture to its readers of the Holy Scriptures declaring the moral glory of God as the heavens declare His natural glory. God's handiwork is presented throughout the pages of the Bible and if you and I are to be familiar with its

contents we must read and study it to find out what God's perfect will is for our livi9ng down here on earth.

If this Psalm is examined correctly, it will be found that there are ten things which are said about the heavens. Then there are ten things said about the law of God; and the rule of poetic parallels demands that there should be a relation between these two sections, and their minor members. Let us look into this mutual relationship.

Authur T Pierson says: In order to discover the beautiful correspondence between this tribute to the sunlit skies, and what is said of the law of God, we should examine still more minutely into this surpassing description of the heavens and the heavenly bodies. "The heavens declare the glory of God:" their brightness and their brilliance are the expressions of Him who is light and glory, supreme and eternal.
