is why things never seem to work. The more free reign given to sin, the more the dysfunction in society
Sin is NOT any of the euphemisms we use to its meaning: mistake, slip-up, human error etc.
Sin IS:; radical centeredness; an issue for and non-Christians alike; an
affront to the; a to the heart of a loving God; self and assault; a
destroyer; a killer; sin is business; it's so and so deeply ingrained in us, Jesus said we would
need to be again; and it would take nothing less than the death of the sinless Son of God to pay the price
Trusting in Jesus, receiving his gifts of forgiveness and eternal life doesn't anything about sin. Sin is still all those things. It just doesn't get the word on our eternal destiny.
If we believe what Jesus says about and what he did to save us from it, we will take it so seriously that
we will be willing to our sin, quick to our sins, and very willing to from ther
We will be horrified to so lightly such a holy God, and at how we have broken his heart.
We won't behind, "Well, it's not that bad." Or, "It's not as bad as others." Or, "I'm a good person." (Jesu
says, "No one is good") Nor, "Well, we're all sinners. I'm only human!" Nor, "Things are just different today
You can't take all of the Bible that seriously."
We also won't be about acknowledging and addressing sin in society.
If all we want from God is a good message that says we're "OK" the way we are, it ain't we
want! And the we get as a result won't be (isn't!) pretty.
The God of Scripture us to see and acknowledge (1) just how bad we really are, (2)
how much it cost him and his Son to save us, (3) what kind of love he must have for us (4) repentance as the
way to experience the explosive transforming power of God's love (5) his way is better by turning from our sin
