
A study of Amos

God Begins with a Roar

1:1 – God sends Amos from the southern kingdom (Judah) to the northern kingdom (Israel).

Life in Israel at this time is pretty good, but their relationship with God is very bad.

1:2 – A sobering introduction: God's message is a "roar." The divine predator is on the hunt.




God Roars at the Nations

God's roar follows a poetic pattern:

- 1. Judgment announced: "For three transgressions, and for four..."
- 2. The reasons are given
- 3. The sentence is read: fire.

God is patient, giving time for sinners to repent.

Yet God WILL judge unrepentant sinners.




God Roars at Judah

- God's roar follows the same pattern.
- Yet the reason for judgment is different: "they have rejected the Law of the Lord," (2:6)

Judah's higher privilege (having God's written law) came with a higher standard.

Their status as God's chosen people didn't exempt them from his judgment on sin.



God Roars at Israel

- 1. Again the same pattern is followed.
- 2. The reason for judgment is much more detailed:
 - immoral living (2:6-8)
 - rejecting God's voice (2:9-12)
- 3. God's judgment can't be avoided.

God essentially says: "My judgment is coming for you, which is incredibly tragic in light of all I've done for you."

A Fatal Presumption

God warns us against the same fatal presumption that he condemned Israel for in Amos' day.

<u>Romans 2:3-5</u>

- Don't let other people's sin blind you to your own (3).
- Don't mistake God's patience for his affirmation (4).
- Our debt collects interest until it is wiped out (5).
