

In Awe of the Majesty of God Psalm 139:1-18

We can live in ignorance of the majesty of God.

Text Message:

- o In this Psalm (Song), the psalmist (songwriter) refers to the big three "Omni-" (Latin word for "all") words to describe God:
 - 1) That God is omniscient (All-Knowing).
 - 2) That God is omnipresent (All-Present).
 - 3) That God is omnipotent (All-Powerful).
- o What flows forth in this Psalm is not from the cold pen of a scholar but the burning heart of a lover!
- o All these Omni words describe the majesty of God, and yet we can live in ignorance of God's majesty!
- o To live in ignorance of God's majesty is to grapple in

the dark with some of life's most important questions:

- 1) Is there someone who will love me despite my scars, flaws, and dark places? (Verses 1, 3)
- 2) Does my past change the way God sees me? (Verse 17)
- 3) Is God really involved in my life? Don't tragedies show that if God created the world, He wound it up like a clock and let it tick on its own, without any personal involvement? (Verses 9-10)
- 4) Does God see my pain and struggles? (Verses 11-12)
- o If this Psalm isn't great enough, God did something more when He showed us exactly what He is like in Christ!

We can live indifferent to the majesty of God.

Text Message:

o "The opposite of love is not hate; it's indifference. The opposite of beauty is not ugliness; it's indifference. The opposite of faith is not heresy; it's indifference. And the opposite of life is not death, but indifference between life and death." Elie Wiesel, Holocaust survivor and Nobel laureate

- o "Such a realization—I am indifferent—is undoubtedly a difficult self-diagnosis. There is difficulty both in coming to and acting upon it, for attending to a not-so-pleasant realization requires attention, honesty, and care rather than indifference. This self-diagnosis is necessary, however, to catch myself from drifting through life in a state of detachment. So often, it takes an unexpected something—music, art, a meaningful conversation—to be the catalyst." Stephanie Reuter
- o "So be diligent and turn from your indifference. Look! I stand at the door and knock. If you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in, and we will share a meal together as friends. Jesus to the Church at Laodicea, Revelation 3:19-20

We can live ignited by the majesty of God.

Text Message:

- o What we need to move from being indifferent to being ignited by the majesty of God is to do what the psalmist does here- reflect on the works and wonders of God!
- o What fascinates and awes you concerning God? What wows you to be ignited by the majesty of God? It could

be the majesty of God:

- 1) Seen in creation.
- 2) Sensed in silence.
- 3) Celebrated in the incarnation of His Son, Jesus.
- 4) Spoken in prayerful reflection of God's Word.
- 5) Sung in praise-filled adoration.
- o Which Omni word captivates you currently? Read the part of Psalm 139 and personalize it.
- o Which of the above four ways of being ignited by God's majesty may the Spirit be nudging you? How will you make space for this soon?
