



Three Shocking Truths About Jesus and Believers

John 2:23-3:8

Jesus loves all people but will not entrust Himself to all people.

John 2:23-25:

Text Message:

o Jesus does something here that is so unlike human nature:

He was not impressed with gathering a large crowd...

He was not swept in to be adored by fans... He bypassed opportunities for popularity and prestige...

- O ^{24a} But Jesus on his part did not entrust himself to them...
- O Who were these people Jesus did not entrust Himself to? Were they people who didn't believe in Jesus?
- O The shocking part is what is said of these people:

 Now when he was in Jerusalem at the Passover Feast,
 many believed in his name when they saw the signs that
 he was doing.
- o These were not "unbelievers," but devout (they were at the Passover Feast) **and** they believed in His name!
- O Yet Jesus did not entrust Himself to them!
- o Shouldn't this cause each of us to pause?

 Am I someone Jesus can entrust Himself to?

 Are we a community Jesus can entrust Himself to?

 If He did not entrust Himself to believers, then who?

Jesus entrusts himself not to those who believe, but those who are born again. John 3:1-3:

Text Message:

- o There is an unfortunate separation that takes place in our English Bibles due to chapter divisions. The Nicodemus account is the continuing story of Chapter 2:
 - 1) John 3 begins with the word "Now," which links

- this to what has gone before. "Now" could be translated as "But;" meaning what we will see here is a contrast to 2:23-25.
- 2) Notice how Nicodemus is tied to those described in 2:23-25 because he too makes a profession of faith and mentions "signs" (a keyword in 2:23 and 3:2).
- o Jesus says to the believing Nicodemus (who represents all the people in 2:23 who believed): "unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God" (3:3).
- o You can believe but not be born again, but you cannot be born again and not believe!
- o Ancient Jews referred to converts to Judaism as "newborn babes," here Jesus uses this imagery with a Jewish man!

Jesus entrusts himself to those who have entered His kingdom.

⁷ Do not marvel that I said to you, `You must be born again.'"

Text Message:

o Verse 3 links being born again with seeing the kingdom of God. The kingdom of God to first-century Jews never meant what would happen in heaven after death, but God's rule on earth: Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in

heaven. Matthew 6:10

- o Therefore, to "see the kingdom" means surrender to the will of God, where Jesus sits on the throne of life and not self!
- o In Verse 7, the first word "you" is singular, referring to Nicodemus. The second "you" is plural, referring to all people!
- o Where am I right now with Jesus? Is Jesus on the throne of my life? Am I (are we) a person (community) Jesus can trust?
