Study # 13 - Saul and the Witch of En Dor 1 Samuel 28:3-25

I. PROPERLY OBSERVING THE TEXT 28:3-25

A. THE REQUEST OF SAUL v3-11

1. HIS REASONS v3-6

- a) Fear Saul's fears grew as the battle lines were drawn.
- b) Failure Saul's refusal to listen to God had closed the heavens over his life! cf. 1 Sam. 14:37; ls. 59:2
 - While God no longer answered Saul's inquiries, David gained ready answers. cf. 1 Sam. 23:2, 4; 30:8

2. HIS REACTION v7

 Consistent with the way he has lived, Saul seeks out a woman who practices that which he has forbidden. v3 cf. Lev. 19:31; 20:6, 27; Deut. 18:9-12

3. HIS REQUEST v8-11

- Saul disguises himself and, under the cover of night, appeals to a medium to conduct a séance.
- When the woman objects, hypocritically, and true to his nature, Saul swears by the LORD that she will not be harmed.
- Once she is assured that no harm will come to her, she concedes and receives Saul's request: "Bring up Samuel!"

B. THE REACTION OF THE WOMAN v12-14

- The woman is startled by the appearance of the spirit and immediately sees through Saul's disguise.
- After pressing her for an answer, the woman informs Saul that she has seen "spirits" or "gods" coming up from the underworld! "Then Saul perceived that it was Samuel!"

C. THE REBUKE OF "SAMUEL" v15-19

- Saul dialogs with the spirit, who reminds Saul of his continuous rejection of God and of God's rejection of him.
- The death of Saul and his sons is then predicted.

D. THE REMORSE OF SAUL v20-25

- Out of fear, Saul falls prostrate, and must be persuaded to rise and eat to regain his strength for the journey home.

II. CAREFULLY INTERPRETING THE CONTEXT 28:3-25

A. THE QUESTION WE MUST RAISE

1. How should this passage be interpreted?

- a) Was this a definite appearance of the Prophet Samuel?
- b) Was this a deceptive appearance of a demonic spirit?

B. THE ANSWERS WE MUST RECEIVE

1. Would God employ the pagan practices He'd condemned as a legitimate way of communicating His will?

 If God desired to speak to Saul He would have chosen a way that was consistent with His nature. cf. v6, 15

2. Would God permit an individual who was in violation of His principles to have authority over a Prophet of God?

- How could it be possible that a prophet of such magnitude as Samuel would be subject to a measly fortuneteller?

3. Would God be part of an activity outside of His will, and then judge the individuals who participated in it?

- 1 Chronicles 10:13 points to this event as one of the reasons why Saul died. cf. 1 Sam. 31:1-6; James 1:13-15

C. THE DETAILS WE MUST REGARD

- Saul told the women who he wanted to see. v11
- The woman herself was shocked that something appeared. v12
- Saul saw nothing, but "perceived" that it was Samuel. v13,14
- Saul tells the spirit what he wants to hear. v15
- The spirit tells Saul things he already knew. v16-18
 cf. 1 Sam. 15:20-23, 28; 18:12; 24:21
- The only new details are concerning Saul's pending death! v19
 - To amplify "the fear of death" against Saul is consistent with Satan's nature and work. cf. Jn. 10:10; Heb. 2:14-15

III. FAITHFULLY APPLYING THE TRUTH

A. GUARD YOUR HEART

- There is no way that anyone can use this passage to justify participating in that which God has unconditionally prohibited!
- Satan's power stands behind the various occult activities. - cf. 2 Thess. 2:8-12; Matt. 24:24; Acts 8:9-11; 2 Cor. 11:13-15
- Opening yourself to this area can result in irreparable damage and even eternal loss. cf. 1 Tim. 4:1; Eph. 4:27; 2 Cor. 2:11

B. GUARD YOUR HOUSE

- Purge your home of any evil influences or associations, and teach your children to desist from opening any door to evil.
 - cf. Rom. 13:12; 2 Cor. 6:14-16; Eph. 5:11; Deut. 6
- Deliverance is possible through the total renunciation of evil and a full consecration to Christ as Lord. cf. Acts 19:18-20
