We acknowledge that our church is on the traditional homelands of the Puyallup Tribe.



The Advent Wreath

The circular shape of the wreath symbolizes the eternity of God, our everlasting life in him, and his infinite love.

Candles represent Jesus as the light of the world. The white candle represents purity, Jesus was without sin. It also represents the true fact that Jesus washes away our sins and makes us whole.

The purple candles symbolize prayer.

Holly leaves represent the crown of thorns Jesus wore when he died for us.

Red berries symbolize the drops of blood that cleanse us from sin.

Pine cones symbolize new life.

The beautiful table was designed and constructed by Bruce Carpenter. The legs of the table are made from the same wood as the spindles on the ramp railing. The top of the table is made in a sunburst pattern of several types of wood, and the center medallion has a carved dove. Many thanks to Bruce from all of us.
