## Uncertainty is why the world needs leaders.

### Three Essentials for Navigating Uncertainty

- **1.** Moral authority (alignment in what we say and what we do).
- **2.** Clarity (clarity is perceived and experienced as leadership).
- **3. <u>Humanity</u>** (the ability to show empathy, compassion, and generosity towards others)

### Pastor = Shepherd

During times of disruption and uncertainty, our families, our communities, and our employees need to be shepherded because they need protection, security, and reassurance.

Shepherding is not necessarily what people need **MOST**, but it is what they need **FIRST**.

When people were faced with uncertainty, **Jesus moved in their direction**...

So they went away by themselves in a boat to a solitary place. But many who saw them leaving recognized them and ran on foot from all the towns and got there ahead of them. When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. So he began teaching them many things.

Mark 6:32-34 (NIV)

He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes on ahead of them, and his sheep follow him because they know his voice. **John 10:3-4 (NIV)**

Your voice is more important than your words.

I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for his sheep. The hired hand is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep. So when he sees the wolf coming, he abandons the sheep and runs away. The man runs away because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep. John 10:11-13 (NIV)

- 3. Have you ever been pastored or shepherded by someone through a difficult season? What did they do or say that made a difference?
