

# 5-Day Advent Devotional: The God Who Sees and Saves

## Day 1: The Jealousy of Holy Love

**Reading:** Nahum 1:1-8

**Devotional:** God's jealousy is not petty envy but passionate protection. When Scripture declares that "a jealous and avenging God is the Lord," it reveals a Father who refuses to share His children with destructive idols. His jealousy flows from perfect love—He knows that life, joy, and freedom exist only in Him. Whatever competes for your heart will ultimately enslave you. God opposes these rivals not because He needs your worship, but because you need Him. His jealousy is ablaze with holy love that will not let you be quietly consumed by what cannot save you. Today, identify what competes with God for your affection. His jealous love invites you to return home, where you truly belong.

## Day 2: Finding Refuge in the Storm

**Reading:** Nahum 1:7; Psalm 46:1-11

**Devotional:** "The Lord is good, a stronghold in the day of trouble, and He knows those who take refuge in Him." A stronghold matters only when the threat is genuine. God's refuge doesn't deny the reality of danger—it declares that He has anticipated it and made a way through it. This isn't distant protection; it's covenant intimacy. He doesn't merely allow you to hide behind Him; He knows you, recognizes you, and claims you as His own. In whatever battle you face—spiritual, relational, physical—God invites you to take refuge in Him. Not in your own strength, not in temporary securities, but in the unchanging character of your Father. Today, consciously bring your fears to Him and rest in His protective presence.

## Day 3: The End of False Securities

**Reading:** Nahum 2:1-13; Matthew 7:24-27

**Devotional:** Nineveh believed itself secure—thick walls, feared armies, unmatched wealth. Yet God declared, "Whatever you devise against the Lord, He will make a complete end of it." Human power always overestimates itself; divine judgment never miscalculates. We build our own Ninevehs: careers that promise fulfillment, relationships that guarantee happiness, achievements that ensure significance. But Jesus didn't come to negotiate with our false securities—He came to replace them with Himself. The same Jesus who entered Jerusalem on a donkey will return on a white horse. What are you trusting in besides Christ? Today, examine where you've placed false security and surrender those things to the only One who is truly unshakeable.

## Day 4: Saved From Wrath Through Christ

**Reading:** Romans 5:1-11

**Devotional:** "While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Much more then, having now been justified by His blood, we shall be saved from the wrath of God through Him." This is the heart of Advent: Christ absorbed the judgment we deserved. Before Christ, we stood condemned, with God's righteous wrath awaiting us. But Jesus stepped between us and that wrath, taking the full force of divine justice upon Himself. This should produce both gratitude and holy reverence. We don't just celebrate God's love while ignoring His justice—we marvel that His love satisfied His justice through the cross. Today, spend time thanking Jesus specifically for saving you from wrath, not just saving you to blessing.

## Day 5: Living in the In-Between

**Reading:** Nahum 1:15; Romans 10:5-15

**Devotional:** "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news of good things." Advent teaches us to live in the in-between—between Christ's first coming in humility and His promised return in glory. Christ has come once to bear wrath for sinners. Christ is with His people now by His Spirit. Christ will come again to finish what He began. We wait, but not passively. We are sent with good news: "Whoever calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." As you enter a new year, commit to being a disciple who makes disciples. Don't just accumulate knowledge of God—pour it into others. Let 2026 be marked by your faithful witness to the One who came, who is with us, and who is coming again.
