The Mission

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Preparation for the Fast

Why Fast?

Fasting is a spiritual tool God uses to advance his kingdom, change the destiny of nations, spark revival, and bring breakthroughs in people's lives. Every Nation churches and campus ministries begin each year with five days of prayer and fasting to humble ourselves before God, consecrate ourselves to him for the upcoming year, and corporately agree for breakthroughs.

Jesus fasted.

Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. And after fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry.

Matthew 4:1-2

*And Jesus returned in the power of the Spirit to Galilee, and a report about him went out through all the surrounding country. **Luke 4:14***

Jesus knew he was going to need spiritual strength to fulfill his purposes. Fasting makes us spiritually strong and prepares us to do God's work.

Fasting is an act of humility and consecration.

*Then I proclaimed a fast there, at the river Ahava, that we might humble ourselves before our God, to seek from him a safe journey for ourselves, our children, and all our goods. **Ezra 8:21***

As we humble ourselves through prayer and fasting, we can receive God's answers to our prayers.

Fasting helps us become sensitive to the Holy Spirit.

While they were worshipping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, “Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them.” Acts 13:2

When we deny ourselves of natural cravings and worldly distractions, we become more sensitive to God’s voice, allowing us to better focus on God and submit to his will.

Fasting brings revival.

And your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to dwell in. Isaiah 58:12

Throughout history, God has brought revival and delivered nations from destruction in response to prayer and fasting. Fasting helps us persevere in prayer and intercession.

Fasting is healthy.

Fasting cleanses your digestive system from toxins. Doctors consider fasting a cure for certain allergies and diseases. The discipline of fasting helps break unhealthy addictions in our lives.

Planning Your Fast

Then Joshua said to the people, “Consecrate yourselves, for tomorrow the Lord will do wonders among you.” Joshua 3:5

Pray—Spend time reading the Bible before the fast. Ask the Holy Spirit for guidance in your prayers. On pages 7-9, write down your faith goals and specific prayer requests for your family, friends, church, and nation.

Commit—Pray about the kind of fast you will undertake and commit to it ahead of time. Record your plan on page 5. Ask God for grace to help you follow through with your decisions.

Act—Start eating smaller portions a few days before the fast. Avoid food high in sugar and fat. Plan to limit physical and social activities for the week of the fast. Ask someone to be your prayer partner throughout the fast and have that person sign page 5.

NOTE: Consult a physician, especially if you are pregnant, nursing, or taking medication. Determine what will work best if your situation does not allow you to do a full fast.

While Fasting

[Jesus] answered, “It is written, ‘Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.’” **Matthew 4:4**

Focus—Set aside time to work through the devotionals. Be ready to respond to God’s Word and the leading of the Holy Spirit.

Pray—Join at least one prayer meeting in your local church. Intercede for your family, church, pastors, nation, campuses, and missions throughout the week.

Replenish—During mealtimes, read the Bible and pray. Drink plenty of water and rest as much as you can. Be ready for temporary bouts of physical weakness and mental annoyances like impatience and irritability.

Breaking the Fast

And this is the confidence that we have toward him, that if we ask anything according to his will he hears us. And if we know that he hears us in whatever we ask, we know that we have the requests that we have asked of him. **1 John 5:14–15**

Eat—Reintroduce solid food gradually. Your body will need time to adjust to a normal diet. Start with fruits, juices, and salad, then add more vegetables. Eat small portions throughout the day.

Pray—Don’t stop praying! Trust God’s faithfulness and timing. Carry your newfound passion for God throughout the year. Be in faith for God to answer your prayers.

Day One
Pray

The mission does not start with our planning; it starts on our knees.

God never intended His mission to be accomplished through human effort alone. It advances when His people humbly seek Him, listen to His voice, and rely on the leading of the Holy Spirit. As we pray today, we lift up the next generation—students, young leaders, and future disciple-makers whom God is raising up to influence campuses, communities, and nations for His glory.

Luke 10:2

And he said to them, “The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.

Before Jesus sent the seventy-two, He first gave them a prayer burden: “The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest.” This shows us that mission begins not with human strategy but with divine dependence. Prayer is not a religious opening before the real work begins; prayer is part of the real work.

When we pray, our hearts become aligned with God's heart. We begin to see people as He sees them. Our compassion grows, our faith deepens, and our dependence shifts from our own abilities to the power of the Holy Spirit. Prayer opens our eyes to the harvest and reminds us that it belongs to God, the workers are sent by God, and the results come from God because our dependence shifts from human ability to the power of the Holy Spirit.

Therefore, the first act of mission is humble, earnest, faith-filled prayer. When the church prays, it acknowledges that no program, personality, budget, or strategy can replace the supernatural work of God.


A praying church is a church that invests in the next generation. If we are not praying for students and young people, we are missing one of the greatest mission fields God has entrusted to us. Prayer enlarges our vision, deepens our burden for the next generation, and awakens us to the spiritual needs of students on our campuses. It moves us from simply hoping for change to actively believing God for transformed lives.

Psalm 2:8 says, *“Ask of me, and I will make the nations your heritage.”*

God invites His people to pray boldly for campuses, schools, universities, and the young leaders He is raising up. As we pray for Every Nation Campus, we ask God to draw students to Himself, establish them in His truth, and empower them to become disciple-makers who will influence their generation. We pray because we believe that today's students are tomorrow's leaders, and that God desires to use them to impact campuses, cities, and nations for His glory.

Reflection

During fasting, we voluntarily lay aside physical appetite so that our spiritual hunger may be renewed. As we fast, we ask God to give us His heart for the next generation. What burdens do you carry for the students and young people around you? How might God use your prayers, encouragement, and example to help them follow Jesus and fulfill His calling?




Application

As you spend time with God today, pray specifically for Every Nation Campus, students, and young leaders. Ask God to draw many young people to Christ, establish them in His Word, and raise them up as disciple-makers who will influence their schools, universities, workplaces, and communities.

Pray for campus missionaries, student leaders, volunteers, and those investing in the next generation. Ask the Holy Spirit to give them wisdom, boldness, favor, and endurance as they share the gospel and make disciples.

Finally, pray that God would open doors in schools and universities, raise up future leaders from among the students, and use Every Nation Campus to reach campuses, transform lives, and impact nations for the glory of God.

Day Two
Send

Every believer is called to be either a faithful goer or a generous sender.

God has uniquely positioned each of us to participate in His mission. While some are called to go to the nations, all are called to support, encourage, and invest in the advancement of the gospel beyond themselves.

Luke 10:3


Go your way; behold, I am sending you out as lambs in the midst of wolves.

Mission requires sending. The seventy-two did not appoint themselves; they were sent by Jesus. This means mission is not self-promotion, personal adventure, or religious ambition. Mission is obedience to the Sender.

Romans 10 reminds us that people cannot believe unless they hear, and they cannot hear unless someone preaches, and someone cannot preach unless they are sent. Sending is therefore not secondary to mission; it is essential to mission. A sending church understands that the harvest requires a whole community, not only a few visible workers.

Reflection

During fasting, we voluntarily lay aside physical appetite so that our spiritual hunger may be renewed. As we fast, we ask God to give us His heart for the lost. We ask Him to make us aware of people we have overlooked, nations we have forgotten, and opportunities we have ignored.




Application

As you spend time with God today, ask Him to give you His heart for the lost. Pray for family members, friends, coworkers, classmates, or neighbors who do not yet know Christ. Ask the Lord of the harvest to raise up and send more workers into the fields that are ready for harvest.

Pray that the Holy Spirit would fill you and His Church with boldness, compassion, wisdom, and discernment to faithfully share the gospel. Ask God to help our church become increasingly mission-minded—focused not merely on gathering people, but on making disciples and reaching communities with the love of Christ.

Finally, lift up the nations, unreached peoples, and the diverse communities represented in our city. Pray that many would encounter Jesus and that God would use His Church to advance His kingdom among every tribe, tongue, and nation.

Day Three
Go

We cannot claim to follow Jesus if we refuse to go where He is sending us.

Often, God's greatest work in us happens when we take a step of obedience toward Him. As we surrender our plans, fears, and comforts, He leads us into deeper faith, greater freedom, and lasting transformation.

Luke 10:4-10

⁴Carry no moneybag, no knapsack, no sandals, and greet no one on the road. ⁵Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace be to this house!' ⁶And if a son of peace is there, your peace will rest upon him. But if not, it will return to you. ⁷And remain in the same house, eating and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages. Do not go from house to house. ⁸Whenever you enter a town and they receive you, eat what is set before you. ⁹Heal the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' ¹⁰But whenever you enter a town and they do not receive you, go into its streets and say, 'The seventy-two did not send themselves; they were sent by Jesus. Mission begins with God, and He invites His Church to participate in His work of reaching the nations. Sending is not merely a ministry activity — it is an expression of obedience to the One who sends.'

Jesus gave the seventy-two urgent and specific instructions. They were to go with simplicity, dependence, peace, hospitality, healing, and a clear message: “The kingdom of God has come near to you.” Their going was not casual; it was intentional. They were sent into real towns, real homes, real relationships, and real needs.

To go is to step beyond comfort and into obedience. Jesus instructed His disciples to travel light, depend on God, and faithfully represent His kingdom wherever they went. This reminds us that following Christ requires trust, surrender, and a willingness to obey even when it stretches us beyond what is familiar.

Going is not only about crossing geographical boundaries. It is about bringing the presence of Christ into everyday spaces—our homes, workplaces, friendships, communities, and church family. God calls every believer to be actively engaged in His kingdom purposes right where He has placed them.

Personal breakthrough is often found on the other side of obedience. Sometimes we pray for change while holding on to fear, comfort, unforgiveness, pride, distraction, or areas of compromise. Yet God invites us into a deeper surrender. As we consecrate ourselves to Him, He transforms our hearts, renews our minds, and empowers us to walk in His purposes.

God also desires His Church to move forward in faith. A healthy church is made up of believers who are growing in discipleship, serving faithfully, loving one another, and advancing God's kingdom together. As each member responds to God's call, the entire church becomes stronger, healthier, and more effective in fulfilling His mission.



Prayer

Heavenly Father,

Today, I surrender my plans, fears, comforts, and limitations to You. Search my heart and reveal anything that is keeping me from fully following Your will. Help me lay aside every distraction, doubt, and area of compromise so that I may walk in wholehearted obedience to You.

Lord, bring breakthrough in every area of my life that needs Your transforming power. Strengthen my faith where I am weak, heal what is broken, and renew my passion for You. Let Your grace empower me to trust You more deeply and follow You more faithfully each day.

I also lift up my family and my church before You. May our homes become places of prayer, discipleship, and spiritual growth. Strengthen Your Church, unite us in purpose, and use us to reflect Christ in our communities. Wherever You call me to go, give me the courage to obey and the willingness to serve. May my life bring glory to Your name and help others draw near to You.





Prayer

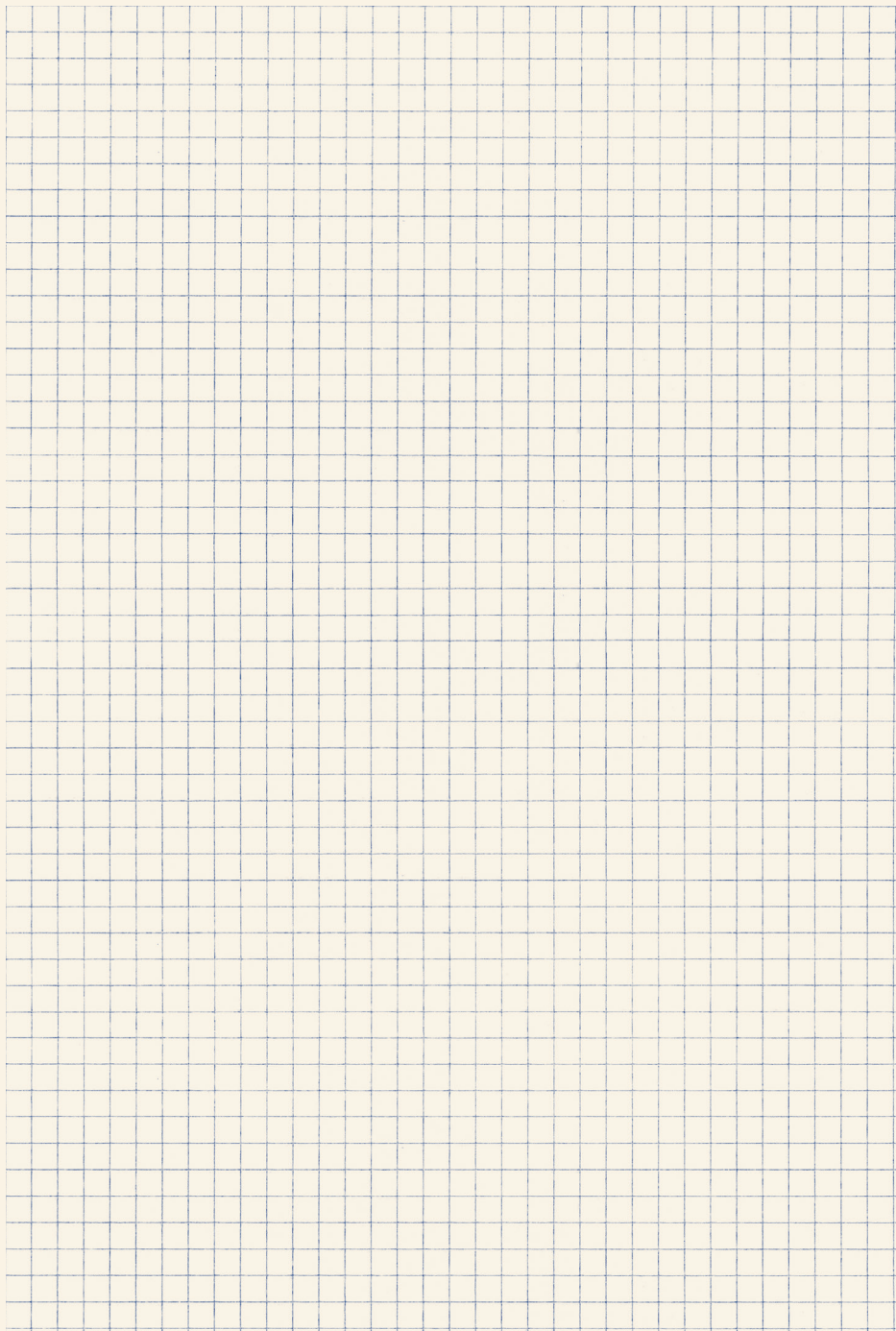
Heavenly Father,
