Romans 11:33-36


Worship begins with God's call to us to worship him. As always, God initiates with us, such as we are, and invites us to be with him out of sheer mercy.

In the Doxology we join our voices with Christians around the world and through the centuries (circa 1674) with this song of praise to the Holy Trinity.



Confession of Sin


[Pray aloud together]

The Apostles' Creed

All: Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!


Minister: The gifts of God for the people of God.




