

## HUNGER & THIRST | Desperation & Devotion

DAVID: Fasted for Mercy and Brokenness

**SERIES BIG IDEA :** *God is never distant, yet He invites us to experience His nearness most fully as His grace awakens a holy hunger within us.*

When God's people were desperate for mercy, direction, strength, or renewal, they did not turn to strategy — they turned to **fasting, prayer, and surrender.**

*"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be filled."* — Matthew 5:6

### OPENING

Church, when most people fail, they hide. When David failed, he **fasted.**

**Text:** 2 Samuel 12:16–23

**16** David pleaded with God for the child. He fasted and spent the nights lying in sackcloth on the ground. **17** The elders of his household stood beside him to get him up from the ground, but he refused, and he would not eat any food with them. **18** On the seventh day the child died. David's attendants were afraid to tell him that the child was dead, for they thought, "While the child was still living, he wouldn't listen to us when we spoke to him. How can we now tell him the child is dead? He may do something desperate." **19** David noticed that his attendants were whispering among themselves, and he realized the child was dead. "Is the child dead?" he asked. "Yes," they replied, "he is dead." **20** Then David got up from the ground. After he had washed, put on lotions and changed his clothes, he went into the house of the LORD and

worshiped. Then he went to his own house, and at his request they served him food, and he ate. **21** His attendants asked him, “Why are you acting this way? While the child was alive, you fasted and wept, but now that the child is dead, you get up and eat!” **22** He answered, “While the child was still alive, I fasted and wept. I thought, ‘Who knows? The LORD may be gracious to me and let the child live.’ **23** But now that he is dead, why should I go on fasting? Can I bring him back again? I will go to him, but he will not return to me.”

Not because he thought he could undo the consequences — but because he knew the only place to take his brokenness was the presence of God.

Our culture tells us to fix, justify, spin, move on. But Scripture shows us something far more holy:

**BIG IDEA: True repentance doesn't just change behavior — it breaks the heart.**

**Breakthrough begins where hearts break.**

David's fasting was not about escaping consequences. It was about **returning to God.**

**FASTING FLOWS FROM CONVICTION, NOT CONVENIENCE**

*“David pleaded with God for the child. He fasted and went into his house and spent the nights lying on the ground.” — 2 Samuel 12:16*

David doesn't post about this. He doesn't gather attention. He doesn't rationalize his sin.

He collapses before God.

*"I humbled myself with fasting."* — Psalm 35:13

*"Return to Me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning."* — Joel 2:12

Fasting is not spiritual discipline for the impressive — it is the desperate cry of those who know they cannot save themselves.

### **BROKENNESS IS THE GATEWAY TO RESTORATION**

*"A broken and contrite heart, O God, You will not despise."* — Psalm 51:17

*"I dwell with the one who is contrite and lowly in spirit."* — Isaiah 57:15

God does not run from broken people — He **moves toward them**.

Fasting strips away illusion. It exposes the truth: *I am not enough — but You are.*

This is not self-punishment. This is **holy humility**.

### **MATURE FAITH TRUSTS GOD BEYOND OUTCOMES**

*"While the child was still alive, I fasted and wept... But now that he is dead, why should I fast? Can I bring him back again?"* — 2 Samuel 12:22-23

David worships **after the loss**.

That is not resignation — that is resurrection faith.

*"Though the fig tree does not bud... yet I will rejoice in the Lord."* —  
Habakkuk 3:17–18

This is what fasting forms in us:

Not control — but **confidence**. Not outcomes — but **obedience**. Not answers — but **assurance**.

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## ALTAR RESPONSE

Church, these 21 days are not about how well you fast — it is about **how deeply you return**.

Let the Spirit expose gently.

Let repentance be tender.

Let brokenness become beautiful.

**PRAYER:** Lord, we are not fasting to be seen — we are fasting because we are desperate for You. Break what is false in us. Heal what is wounded in us. Restore what is weary in us. And let breakthrough begin not around us — but within us. In Jesus' name, Amen.
