"Blind, Deaf, And A Little Bit Dumb"

On a foggy morning in the summer of 1952, a young woman named Florence Chadwick waded into the numbing cold water off Catalina Island. She planned to swim the 26-mile channel from the island to the California coast. Long-distance swimming was not new to her; she was the first woman to swim the English Channel in both directions.

The fog was so thick she could hardly see the boats in her party. She swam 15 hours then asked to be taken out of the water. Her trainer tried to encourage her to swim on since they were so close to land, but when Florence looked, all she saw was fog. So, she quit - one-mile from her goal. Later she said, "If I could have seen the land I might have made it." It wasn't the cold or fear or exhaustion that caused Chadwick to fail. It was the fog.

Sometimes we too fail, not because we're afraid or lack courage or because of anything other than the fact that we can't see where we are going. We lose sight of the shore. It is a challenge to follow Jesus when a fog bank blurs our vision. That fog could come in the form of fear, or worry, or confusion, or stress. Whatever the form, the fog clears as we grow in our understanding of who Jesus is. **We gain clarity in life as we gain clarity about Jesus.** When your understanding of Jesus grows clear, so does your vision. In Mark 8 Jesus gives His disciples a vision test. Mark's gospel records how a group of twelve average people gained their spiritual sight over time. Have you had your vision checked lately?

Jesus extends a warm hand to the hungry. 8:1-10. Does this miracle sound familiar? In chapter 6 Jesus fed 5,000. Here He feeds 4,000. Surely this must be a mistake. Whoever complied these stories must have stuttered and recorded the same story twice. There are some interesting differences between the two stories. The first group of 5,000 is mostly Jews. The second group is mostly Gentiles. That may explain why the first group has 12 baskets, a Jewish number, and the second group 7, a number favored by Gentiles. But what is more important about the repeating of this miracle is the response of the Pharisees and Jesus' own disciples.

Jesus offers a cold shoulder to the Pharisees. 8:11-13. After this second miracle of a miraculous feeding the Pharisees ask for a sign. It is not uncommon that when our vision gets blurry, we look for a sign. A sign is something that points beyond itself to something greater. Jesus often did something miraculous then added a sermon to interpret the sign. For example, in John's telling of the feeding of the 5,000, Jesus follows with the claim, "I am the bread of life." The disciples **cannot** see but the Pharisees **will not** see. They remind me of a scene from an old movie starring Steven Martin...Man With Two Brains.

The Pharisees wanted a sign but what they got from Jesus was a sigh. (v. 12). How many miracles must He perform before these guys stop asking for a sign? The Pharisees aren't the only ones who are blind and deaf and a little bit dumb. The disciples are in the same boat – the wrong boat.

Jesus issues a stern warning to His disciples. 8:14-21. They get in a boat with Jesus and He warns them, "Beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and of Herod." "Leaven" *was a common Jewish metaphor for an invisible, pervasive, corrupting influence.* In this context the Pharisees reject the truth and increasingly harden their hearts to Jesus. The response of the disciples is almost humorous...v. 16. They completely missed the point. Jesus lays into them with eight questions in vv. 17-21.

Their problem is not bread – the Bread is in the boat! If you have the Bread of Life in your boat you'll never go hungry. Then what's going on here? These guys aren't stupid. They have seen Jesus exercise authority over nature, demons, sickness and death and feed thousands with a few loaves of bread and a couple of fish. Why do they still not get it? The answer was found in 6:52, "for they did not understand about the loaves, but their hearts were hardened." They had a heart problem. One of the symptoms of a hard heart is the failure for information to impact your life. You can be intimately familiar with details about Christ and miss the significance of Christ. "You search the Scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that bear witness about me, ⁴⁰ yet you refuse to come to me that you may have life." (Jn. 5:39-40). They missed the point. It happens to us all the time. You know I had a heart attack. God orchestrated that emergency so that all the right people were in the right places to save my life. I saw Jesus in all of it...until the medical bills started coming in. Do you suppose I said, "The same God who bore

me on eagle's wings and saved my life will pay these bills?" No, I said, "Where are we going to get the bread to pay these bills?"

Is there a solution to this problem? Fortunately, there is. The key to understanding what Mark is trying to say to us is found in the miracles just before and just after the feeding of the 4,000. In 7:31-37 opens the ears of a deaf man. But let's look at the miracle just after the feeding episode.

Jesus improves the vision of those who believe. 8:22-26. This twostage healing process is puzzling. What's going on here? Is Jesus just having an "off" day? Has He done so many miracles that He is losing a little of His healing power? What Jesus is doing here is genius. His actions with this blind man provide the perfect conclusion to the first major section of Mark's gospel. The emphasis from the beginning of this book is the identity of Jesus Christ. John the Baptist knows who He is. God the Father knows who He is. Jesus knows who He is. The demons know who He is. The desperate people on the margins of society know who He is. The only two groups who aren't sure who He is are the Pharisees and sadly, His own disciples. It is no big surprise when proud, self-sufficient people reject Jesus. It is a little surprising when those who signed up to follow Him lose sight of who He is. But the healing of this blind man is a hopeful sign for the disciples. Their vision is still a little blurry and will continue to be. But, as we will see next week, (I don't want to steal Chris Young's thunder) their vision will improve over time until, after the resurrection when they will see things clearly.

So, how's your vision? What do you see when you look at your current circumstances? What do we see in the future for this church? If we fail to see Jesus for who He is then what difference is there between us and those who do not acknowledge Him as Lord?

A follower of Jesus sees all of life through who He is. Jesus will provide. He can open the eyes of the blind and open the ears of the deaf, but we can't afford to be dumb. God always provides. When the world was destroyed by a flood God provided a boat. When Abraham was about to take the life of his only son God provided a ram. When the Israelites were slaves in Egypt God provided a lamb. When everyone did what was right in their own eyes God provided a godly woman named Deborah. When Israel was a captive in Babylon God provided a prophet. When Jesus died on a cross and the hopes of His disciples died with Him, God provided a resurrection. When the Romans crucified Christians, God provided the Holy and the gospel spread like wildfire. And in a stroke of delicious irony, Rome even built the roads to insure the spread the Good News all over the world.

Your vision might be a little blurry this morning. You may be living in a fog bank and you can't see the shore. You can put God to the test like the Pharisees did and ask for a sign or you can go forward by faith knowing that God always provides.

Which boat are you in? Are you in the same boat as the Pharisees? Get in the boat with Jesus and trust Him. Let Jesus open your eyes and ears and help you perceive how your present circumstances will work out of the greater progress of the gospel. He will do it. He always has. He always will.

Two months after she failed to swim from Catalina to Long Beach, Florence Chadwick walked off the same beach into the same channel and swam the distance, setting a new speed record, because she could see the shore. Pray
