### Opening Caleb Panter:

- I. Community Call to Disciple Next Generation
  - a. Deuteronomy 6:4-9
    - i. "Now this is the commandment—the statutes and the rules[a]—that the Lord your God commanded me to teach you, that you may do them in the land to which you are going over, to possess it, a that you may fear the Lord your God, you and your son and your son's son, by keeping all his statutes and his commandments, which I command you, all the days of your life, and that your days may be long. Hear therefore, O Israel, and be careful to do them, that it may go well with you, and that you may multiply greatly, as the Lord, the God of your fathers, has promised you, in a land flowing with milk and honey. Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Day to shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates. (SLIDE)
  - b. This is a community-wide call to teach and influence the next generation.
  - c. Next Generation Encouragement
    - i. If you are a student in this room, YOU MATTER!
  - d. This morning, I want to inspire the whole community to work together to recognize our role in this pursuit of influencing the next generation to fall in love with Jesus.
- II. Family Ministry Definition and Fellowship Dallas Mission
  - a. When we talk about Family Ministry, we are talking about
    - i. Ministries at fellowship that work with ages ranging 0-18 (from cradle to graduation)
  - b. When we are talking about the Family Ministry Strategy at Fellowship Dallas, it is intricately tied to the mission of our church which is:
    - i. Calling each other to live out our God-given purpose in Christ everyday (SLIDE)
  - c. Family Ministry Mission
    - i. Calling the next generation to live out their God-given purpose in Christ every day.
    - ii. It is our deepest desire to build and execute a Family Ministry Discipleship strategy that helps the next generation fall more in more in love with Jesus
- III. Influences on Next Generation
  - a. So many influences . . . culture, friends, media, social media, etc.
  - b. We believe there are 2 main influences that need to impact the next generation
    - i. Church
    - ii. Home
  - c. As we look to other ministries and experts in the field of influencing the next generations, our friends at Orange (a non-profit whose mission is to support churches in their work of discipling kids and teenagers) remind us of the power of combining these 2 essential influencers.
    - i. Orange reminds us that "two combined influences can make a greater impact than just two influences."
    - ii. Two truths:
      - 1. No one has more potential to influence a child than a parent. (SLIDE)
      - 2. A parent is not the only influence a child needs. (SLIDE)
        - a. This is where the church comes in.
- IV. Best Practices and Strategy
  - a. Here is ultimately what we are trying to do with our Family Ministry at Fellowship Dallas
    - i. "Influence leaders and parents to create community around the timeless message of Jesus that mobilizes the next generation to live out their God-given purpose in Christ every day."
  - b. So, how do we do this?
    - i. 5 Family Ministry Essentials (these are markers that all successful discipling cultures have Orange)
      - 1. Align leaders around a common strategy and common values. (SLIDE)
        - a. The family ministry at Fellowship Dallas is a team

- i. If we are going to do this well, we must be aligned and all of us must recognize our role in this.
  - 1. Consists of Pastors, lay leaders, parents . . .
  - 2. We will be working toward success when we are all working together aligned with a strategy that helps us think about where we want to go and how we want to get there.

- 1. Refine the message to create engaging, relevant, and memorable experiences. (SLIDE)
  - a. When we look at the facts, most kids and teenagers will show up at our church less than 50% of the time. That means, for example, that we will have about 25-30 hours a year to invest in the life of a typical middle schooler.
  - b. 30% of those hours will be spent
    - i. Trying to find the room
    - ii. Interacting in games
    - iii. Updating their social media
    - iv. And saying goodbye to each other as they leave
  - c. That same middle schooler will spend
    - i. 200 hours studying math
    - ii. Watch on average 500 hours of tv
    - iii. Look at their smart device 900 hours
  - d. Realistically we have somewhere between 20 and 40 hours with them this year as a church (unless there is a retreat or an extended time with them)
    - i. In these 20 40 hours, we must prioritize and say what matters most.
    - ii. We are committed to:
      - 1. Teaching Jesus
      - 2. Making sure every student know that they are made on purpose for a purpose
      - 3. And to keep improving how we create and communicate timeless content for the sake of one's faith
- 2. Elevate community so relationships are a priority. (SLIDE)
  - a. Here's what we know.
    - i. Leaders who connect with kids and students in a small group over time have the potential to make a big impact on their faith.
- 3. Influence service as an integral part of discipleship. (SLIDE)
  - a. There is a big difference in doing ministry for our kids and doing ministry with kids.
  - b. If our students never experience the thrill of playing the game, they can grow up and grow out of church.
  - c. We know that "if we want kids or teenagers to feel significant, we have to give them something significant to do."
- 4. Engage every parent to be the parent they want to be. (SLIDE)
  - a. As a church we have around 40 hours of influence in a year.
  - b. Parents have 3,000 hours of influence in a year.
  - c. What does "engage parents" mean?
    - i. Orange did a study that asked this question.
      - 1. We help parents win when they become . . .
        - a. More intentional at home
        - b. More connected to a community.

- V. Closing challenge
  - a. Deuteronomy 6
    - i. <sup>4</sup>"Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one.<sup>[b] 5</sup> You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might.<sup>6</sup> And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. <sup>7</sup> You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.
  - b. This desire we must "call the next generation to live out their God-given purpose in Christ every day" is going to take all of us.
  - c. This is a church family matter, and we all must find our way to engage in this pursuit.

### Parent Dedication Kristi McElheney:

The passage that Josey just read and Caleb just talked about is called the *Shema*. It was basically the life verse for the Israelites. They recited it every morning and every evening. It was a constant reminder not only to love God with ALL their being, and live their lives according to His Law, but also gave them the responsibility to tell their kids about Him.

When God gave them His Law, His intent was not to be legalistic, His purpose was driven by love and grace. He knew that if they followed His commands, if they stayed within the structure He had given them, they would not only live better lives, but they would also represent Him well and the nations around them would see that they had something different, something good. They would be a good witness for God.

But that wasn't all, as we are reminded in Psalm 78, they couldn't keep it secret, they needed to teach their children. They needed to pass on their faith from generation to generation.

#### **SLIDE: Milestone Verse**

"O my people, hear my teaching; listen to the words of my mouth.

...

We will not hide them from [our] children; we will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord, his power, and the wonders he has done. He decreed statutes for Jacob and established the law in Israel, which he commanded our forefathers to teach their children, so the next generation would know them, even the children yet to be born, and they in turn would tell their children. Then they would put their trust in God and would not forget his deeds but would keep his commands." — Psalm 78:1, 4-7

God gave them a "Faith Succession Plan."

## SLIDE: Milestone Verse

Colossians 2:6-7 (ESV): "Therefore, as you received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving."

In these verses, Paul is speaking to the Colossian church about spiritual progress. He wants them to know the truth so they will not be led astray by other voices in the world, and more than anything else, he wants them to experience LIFE in Christ.

As a Christian, Paul is encouraging the Colossians to always be moving towards **growth** in their faith. That growth is seen in 4 ways here. A healthy, growing Christ-follower is...

- 1. Firmly rooted IN CHRIST, like a tree.
- 2. Because of those firm roots, a growing Christian is also **being built up IN CHRIST** where the growth is visible and expanding.
- 3. A healthy Christian is also **being "established IN THE FAITH"** because of their training in God's Word. Our faith is the establishment from which all of our decisions come from.
- 4. And lastly, a healthy growing Christian is **"abounding in thanksgiving"** when we are in a state of health, a product of that health is an overflowing spirit of gratitude to God.

These are the marks of the Christ-follower we hope our children become and we hope that every mature believer becomes. It's what we are hoping every family in our church begins to work towards when their children are born and then continues to cultivate in their children as they grow into young adults and throughout their entire life. We have a beautiful picture of that this morning in our young families dedicating themselves and now with our graduating seniors.
