



5 Day Devotionals for I AM Worship Church

Day 1: Falling on Your Face

Reading: Joshua 5:13-15

Devotional: Joshua stood before an impossible obstacle when he encountered the Commander of the Lord's army. His first instinct was to ask whose side God was on, but God redirected the question entirely. The breakthrough didn't begin with strategy or strength—it began with surrender. Joshua fell on his face in worship, removing his sandals on holy ground. Before God removes your obstacles, He wants to change your posture. Stop asking God to join your plans and instead ask what His agenda is. The battle doesn't begin with a shout; it begins with surrender. Today, what area of your life needs you to stop recruiting God to your side and instead fall flat on your face before Him?

Day 2: Walking in Silence

Reading: Joshua 6:1-5, 10

Devotional: God's battle plan for Jericho seemed absurd: walk around the city in complete silence for six days. No fighting, no strategizing, no complaining—just obedient walking. These were trained warriors being asked not to do what they did best. God's methods don't always make sense to us, but they don't have to. He wasn't testing their military skill; He was building their faith, discipline, unity, and trust. Sometimes the hardest obedience is continuing when nothing appears to be changing. Silence removes the pressure to narrate your own deliverance. It teaches you to trust God without talking yourself out of His promises. What has God asked you to do that doesn't make sense? Will you keep walking in obedience even when you see no results?



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Day 3: The Process Builds You

Reading: Joshua 6:12-14; Hebrews 11:30

Devotional: God could have knocked down Jericho's walls on day one, but He needed six days to build the right kind of people—people who could possess and steward the promise. While Israel walked on the outside, God was forming them through obedience. Simultaneously, He was working on Rahab's faith inside the walls. God works on both sides of your obstacles. The process you're in isn't punishment; it's preparation. Every lap around your Jericho is building silence, daily discipline, unity, and faith in you. These four things separate people who talk about promises from those who possess them. Don't despise the walking season. God is forming you to handle what's coming. What is God building in you through your current process?

Day 4: Faith Keeps Walking

Reading: Hebrews 11:1, 6; James 2:17-18

Devotional: Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. It's what pleases God. Faith doesn't just believe God can; faith believes God will. Faith at Jericho meant showing up day after day when nothing looked like it was changing. It meant walking past the very thing standing between you and your promise without saying a word. Faith is worship before breakthrough, praise before promise, obedience before outcome. Faith doesn't deny the wall is real; it believes God is bigger. If you can't trust God, you can't trust anything. Don't quit on day three of your journey. Don't trade your day seven victory for the comfort of a plan that makes more sense today. Keep walking. Keep believing. What promise are you walking toward in faith right now?



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Day 5: The Shout of Overflow

Reading: Joshua 6:15-20; Psalm 126:5-6

Devotional: The shout didn't bring the victory—it revealed the faith that had been built through obedience. The miracle didn't begin on day seven; it began on day one when 40,000 men chose to trust God's plan over their own. The shout was the overflow of six days of choosing obedience over understanding, showing up when there were no results, and trusting a plan that made no sense. When your day seven comes, you'll need everything God built in you during the process. The promised land still has issues and challenges, but crossing over means you've been changed to handle a new kind of hard. Your shout is coming, and it will be powerful because of your walking, your faith, your obedience. Are you ready to shout from a place of built-up faith?
