Jesus and the Widow of Nain – God of Compassion Week 6 – "Jesus in My Story" with Mindee Evans-Maxson

- 1. This week, Mindee preached from Luke 7:11-15 about Jesus and the widow of Nain and how this one-on-one encounter with Jesus displays a fundamental characteristic of God: His COMPASSION.
 - a. The Greek phrase used to describe how Jesus felt for the widow after having just lost her only son -splagchnizomai is actually the word for intestines, to mourn or grieve for a person from the liver, the lungs, the guts and the heart.
 - b. Have you ever felt this way on behalf of another person?
- 2. It just so happens that 500 years before Jesus brings the widow's son back to life, in this same location, Elijah performed this exact same miracle (I Kings 17:19-23).
 - a. One of the things that was said about the Jewish coming Messiah, the long-awaited Savior, was that he would come in the spirit of Elijah. What does this mean?
 - b. These two miracles are mirror images for a messianic reason: why is this significant, do you think?
- 3. What do you think of the counseling concept of the "witness of seeing" entering into the heart of someone else's suffering?
 - a. "Witnessing," one therapist was quoted as saying, "is connected to the healing of the world." Do you agree? Why or why not?
 - b. Have you ever been "witnessed" in your pain? What was that experience like? Have you ever had the chance to do this for someone else? Was it difficult? Rewarding?
- 4. The first person to NAME God in the Bible was an immigrant named Hagar who called God, "El Roi," which means "the God who SEES ME."
 - a. Have you ever felt SEEN by God?
 - b. What was that experience like?
- 5. Compassion is passion with a heart.
 - a. So... what are you always talking passionately about?
 - b. What do you most yearn to impart to people?
 - c. What people are you most drawn to help?
 - d. ... what breaks your heart?
