Daniel: Faith in the Fire Daniel 1.8-21 September 17, 2023

Group Sharing:

Do you eat a certain kind of diet? What has been your experience with dieting?

Again, it's a good idea to read all of Daniel 1, if not the whole of Daniel. But for sure, read over Daniel 1.1-7, and get a good idea in your head about what's going on. Recall the major characters of the story and its overall setting. After that, read verses 8-21.

What decision does Daniel make in verse 8? Even though it's difficult to tell, why do you think Daniel drew the line at the food and insisted on only eating water and vegetables? Note the word, "defile" in verse 8. There was something about the food that made him feel unclean, impure. Did he think it wasn't kosher? Then why did he reject wine? If it was because it was offered to idols before being offered to them, why does he eat the vegetables?

The chief eunuch, Ashpenaz, didn't like Daniel's plan, but for some reason, the steward (or guard) went along with it for ten days. What kind of risk do you imagine Daniel was taking by even proposing changing their diet? Why do you think the steward goes along with it? Make sure you make careful note of verse 15. Apparently, this was their diet for the remainder of their three years. How does the whole story turn out when they are finally presented to the king? What do you think it meant to Daniel and his three friends that the king was so impressed by them even though they hadn't been eating his fine food?

As we noticed, "God gave" is all over this chapter. Look at verses 2, 9, and 17, and note what God gave (hint: it's a lot clearer in the English Standard Version). "God gave" serves to underscore the theme of Daniel:

"In spite of present appearances, God is in control."
