Tools for "Cutting It Straight"

There are two ways to take the biblical journey; either **through the experience of another person** or by **personally learning to interpret** (walk through) the Bible yourself.

It is this latter intimate involvement that will make trips through the pages of Scripture unforgettable.

For someone just starting out, I recommend a 'starter set' containing a basic minimum of tools for cutting it straight. This set includes:
