Mark 11:27-12:12

The Authority of the Son and the Conflict it Created (Mark 11:15-18)

- Jesus asserted authority in <u>both word and deed</u>
- The religious leaders saw Jesus as <u>a threat to be eliminated</u>
- His enemies feared the loss of power and prestige

The Authority of the Son in the Baptism of John (Mark 11:27-33)

- The extent of Jesus authority had always been an issue
- Jesus often asked questions to reveal hidden motives

The Authority of the Son and the Purposes of the Father (Mark 12:1-12)

- It was a parable both <u>ominous and amazing</u>
 - <u>Amazing</u> in it's portrayal of God's <u>compassion and grace</u>
 - <u>Ominous</u> in it's stark warning <u>of judgment</u>
- Jesus authority is to be <u>recognized in its completeness or</u> <u>resisted at our peril</u>

For Life Group Discussion

Mark 11:27-12:12

- Are you a rule follower or a rebel, cooperative or independent? On a scale of 1 - 10, what is your default level of resistance to authority? Where does that resistance come from?
- 2. Read Mark 11:18, 11:32, & 12:12. What exactly were the leaders afraid of?
 - What do we learn from Mark 12:38-39 & Matthew 6:1-5 & 23:1-7?
 - Can we be subject to similar temptations? How?
- 3. Read Mark 1:27-28 & 2:1-12. Had Jesus adequately demonstrated His authority in the past? Why were they still asking Him to justify it in our text (Mark 11:28)?
- 4. Read Mark 11:28-30. Why did Jesus often answer a question with a question? What can we learn about interacting with those hostile to the Christian faith?
- 5. Read Mark 12:1-12 and consider:
 - What can we conclude about the owner of the vineyard, based on Jesus' description?
 - How does the quotation from Psalm 11:18 (vs 10-11) fit with the rest of the story?
 - What does this parable teach us about Jesus' authority and sovereignty?
