- Primary views on the structure of Corporate Worship:
 - The Regulative Principle: The belief that only what God has commanded should be included in worship. Key question: "Has God commanded it in Scripture?"
 - The Normative Principle: Anything not forbidden by Scripture is permitted in worship, as long as it is edifying and God-honoring. Key question: "Does it honor God and align with Scripture?

The corporate worship of God's people was of chief concern to the Reformers

• The reformation was not just theological, it was also liturgical

The 10 Commandments are a helpful place to start

- God begins by underscoring His saving work (Ex 20:2). Now, what is the response?
- In the first table of the law God reveals the who, what, how, and when of worship (Ex 20:3-8)

What is actually happening in corporate worship?

- The essence: We are <u>meeting with God</u>, and He is <u>meeting with us</u> in intimate communion (Ps 42:1-2; Ps 84:2)
- By its very nature, worship is never casual or boring (Heb 12:28-29)

"The sign of God's children is to delight to be much in God's presence." – Thomas Watson

So what should we do in corporate worship?

- <u>In spirit</u>, engaged as the Holy Spirit enables, and <u>in truth</u>, or according to how God has told us to worship. (Jn 4:23-24; Lev 10:1-2; 2 Sam 6:6-7)
- We <u>read</u>, <u>peach</u>, <u>pray</u>, <u>sing</u>, <u>confess</u>, <u>and witness</u> the Word in the (ordinances)
- According to the Regulative Principle:
 - o Elements: Things that must be there, since they are fixed by God
 - o Forms: Can look different as long as they don't violate the elements
 - o Circumstances: Variations that don't affect the elements
