

## The Humbling Power of Grace

2 Kings 5:1-19

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### Greatness Cannot Cure Corruption

- Power, success, and reputation cannot address our true need.
- Naaman's leprosy points to humanity's deeper uncleanness of sin.

### Grace Works Through God's Means

- God freely heals through His means, not ours.
- God requires humble, obedient faith rather than human wisdom or merit.
- The simple command to wash points to Christ, through whom God sovereignly grants salvation by grace alone.

### Grace Changes the Heart and Renews the Mind

- Justification by grace alone leads to gratitude.
  - Justification by grace alone leads to exclusive devotion to the true God.
  - Justification by grace alone leads to a reordered life lived under the lordship of Jesus.
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## For Life Group Discussion

2 Kings 5:1-19

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1. Where do you see pride or self-reliance shaping Naaman's initial response to God's command, and how do similar attitudes show up in our own approach to God?
2. Why do you think God chose such a simple and seemingly unimpressive means (washing in the Jordan) to heal Naaman, and what does this teach us about how God ordinarily works?
3. How does Naaman's status as a foreigner shape our understanding of God's grace toward outsiders, and how does this prepare us for the gospel of Christ?
4. What role do servants and "lesser" people play in this passage, and how does God use ordinary or overlooked voices to accomplish His purposes today?
5. In what ways does Naaman's response after his healing (vv. 15–19) show a heart transformed by grace rather than mere gratitude for a miracle?
6. How does this passage help us understand the difference between outward religious activity and true faith that rests in God's word and promises?
