December 1, 2019 THE WONDER OF CHRISTMAS - Part 1 **"The Wonder of a Star"**

With all we can discern from God's creation around us, the one thing we can never know about God is how much He <u>loves</u> us – it's why we need <u>Christmas</u>.

Psalms 8:4 (NLT): "what are mere mortals that you should think about them, human beings that you should care for them?"

The wonder of what Christmas tells us is that God loves us and has come to make His <u>home</u> with us.

John 1:14 (The Message): "The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood...."

Once we believe in Christmas, the world becomes a place of wonder, where God wants to show us the beauty and goodness of all He has made, *if we have eyes to see*.

Matthew 2:1 (ESV): "Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem"

The wise men had knowledge, wealth, power and even religion, but something was missing that led them to travel hundreds of miles.

The wise men were wise because they recognized that what they needed was not *more* of what they already had but something they *didn't* already have.

Ecclesiastes 3:11 (ESV): "... [God] has put eternity into man's heart...."

As beautiful and wonderful as this world is, it wasn't created to satisfy our deepest longings – only <u>God</u> can do that.

Augustine: "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you."

The wise men were wise because they recognized the sign God placed before them.

Matthew 2:2 (ESV): "'Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him.'"

What's amazing is not that the wise men saw the star, because it was visible to everyone, but that they recognized it as a sign from God.

Jesus: "'For God so loved the world, that he *gave* his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life.'" (**John 3:16** ESV, *emphasis added*)

The wise men not only had eyes to see the star as a sign, they had the <u>courage</u> to follow the sign until they found Jesus.

Matthew 2:3-5 (ESV): "3When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; 4and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 5They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea...'"

Isaiah 9:6 (ESV): "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

Too often we allow everyday busyness to keep us from seeking the eternal.

Maybe there was an even deeper and more real reason why the people stayed behind – maybe they were afraid.

God loves us too much to leave us in these places that ultimately hurt us, that are destructive to ourselves.

Too often we see the signs for what they are, but we don't follow them, we don't follow Jesus, out of fear of what he would <u>require</u> of me.

They are questions in our lives that require <u>courage</u> to say, "If all I have is Jesus in my life, he is still enough and more!"

The wise men had eyes to see, courage to follow, but most of all they had humility to worship.

Matthew 2:9-11 (ESV): "9...the star that they had seen when it rose went before them until it came to rest over the place where the child was. 10When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy. 11And going into the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him...."

We don't worship God primarily for what He has done for us but for who He is.

John 1:11-12 (ESV): "11He came to his own, and his own people did not receive him. 12But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God" Those who do come to Jesus, who do have the courage to follow him as his disciples, become <u>children</u> of God.

Like the wondrous star that guided the wise men to Jesus, God has placed signs along our path, too, to guide us and lead us to Himself.
