September 8, 2019 LOVE UNLEASHED - Part 3 "Love Acts"

1 Corinthians 13:4 (NIV): "...[Love] does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud."

1 Thessalonians 2:20 (NLT): "Yes, you are our pride and joy."

versus

Proverbs 16:18 (NLT): "Pride goes before destruction, and haughtiness before a fall."

Destructive pride is <u>selfish</u> to the core, focused on trusting self rather than God, making it <u>sin</u>.

SEVEN SUBTLE SYMPTOMS OF PRIDE (Jonathan Edwards):

- <u>Fault</u>-Finding
- A <u>Harsh</u> Spirit
- <u>Superficiality</u>
- Defensiveness
- <u>Presumption</u>
- Desperation for <u>Attention</u>
- <u>Neglecting</u> Others

Luke 18:9-12 (NLT): "⁹Then Jesus told this story to some who had great confidence in their own righteousness and scorned everyone else: ¹⁰'Two men went to the Temple to pray. One was a Pharisee, and the other was a despised tax collector. ¹¹The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed this prayer: "I thank you, God, that I am not like other people – cheaters, sinners, adulterers. I'm certainly not like that tax collector! ¹²I fast twice a week, and I give you a tenth of my income.""

The Pharisee is not <u>confessing</u> his own sins – he's trying to <u>confess</u> everyone *else's* sins!

1 Timothy 1:15 (NIV): "Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners – of whom I am the worst."

The Apostle Paul didn't try to deceive himself or anyone else, but at the same time he was also confident that Christ had died to save him, too, and his past was no longer what <u>defined</u> him.

Luke 18:13 (NLT): "'But the tax collector stood at a distance and dared not even lift his eyes to heaven as he prayed. Instead, he beat his chest in sorrow, saying, "O God, be merciful to me, for I am a sinner.""

God wants us to acknowledge the truth about ourselves because anything else is a lie, a deception, that leads us down the <u>wrong</u> path.

Hosea 7:10 (CEV): "I am the LORD, their God, but in all of their troubles their pride keeps them from returning to me."

Frank Schell Ballentine: "...the essence of humility is <u>courage</u>...."

Humility is not about tearing ourselves down – it's about having the courage to see and admit the truth, good and bad, and trust God to <u>redeem</u> us.

Luke 18:14 (NLT): "'I tell you, this sinner, not the Pharisee, returned home justified before God. For those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

Philippians 2:5-9 (NLT): "⁵You must have the same attitude that Christ Jesus had. ⁶Though he was God, he did not think of equality with God as something to cling to. ⁷Instead, he gave up his divine privileges; he took the humble position of a slave and was born as a human being. When he appeared in human form, ⁸he humbled himself in obedience to God and died a criminal's death on a cross. ⁹Therefore, God elevated him to the place of highest honor and gave him the name above all other names"

Love accepts someone for who they are and works <u>sacrificially</u> for their good.

Love sacrifices for the sake of another, regardless of whether it benefits <u>me</u> or not.

Philippians 2:3 (NIV): "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves."

Philippians 2:3 (Message): "Don't push your way to the front; don't sweet-talk your way to the top. Put yourself aside, and help others get ahead."

The question is not am I loved, but how am I to treat others, and the Bible says we're to treat them <u>as if</u> they were better than us; in other words, give them our <u>best</u>.

Humble love doesn't knock <u>ourselves</u> down – it just doesn't knock others down to lift me and help me feel better about myself.

We need <u>Jesus</u> in our lives to cleanse us and empower us to love in ways that don't envy, boast or act prideful.

As Jesus showed us, love doesn't envy, boast or act proud – love <u>sacrifices</u>!

Where can I set aside my pride this week and sacrifice for the sake of another?
