March 24, 2019 THE ROAD TO HOPE - Part 1 "Palm Sunday"

We all hope <u>death</u> won't have the last word for our lives.

The Jews were increasingly watching for the coming of the Messiah (Hebrew) or the Christ (Greek), whom they believed would be an ancestor or <u>Son</u> of King David.

The Feast of the Passover raised Jewish nationalist fervor higher, because it celebrated Israel's escape from the <u>Egyptians</u> through the hand of God.

Palm Sunday - Matthew 21:1-11, Mark 11:1-11, Luke 19:29-44, and John 12:12-19

Matthew 21:1-3 (ESV): "¹Now when [Jesus and his disciples] drew near to Jerusalem and came to Bethphage, to the Mount of Olives, then Jesus sent two disciples, ²saying to them, 'Go into the village in front of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her. Untie them and bring them to me. ³If anyone says anything to you, you shall say, "The Lord needs them," and he will send them at once.'"

In riding in on a donkey's colt, Matthew is showing us that Jesus is intentionally giving the people a prophetic Old Testament <u>symbol</u>.

Matthew 21:4-6 (ESV): "⁴This took place to fulfill what was spoken by the prophet, saying, ⁵'Say to the daughter of Zion, "Behold, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a beast of burden." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them." (Isaiah 62:11, Zechariah 9:9)

Matthew 21:7-9 (ESV): "⁷They brought the donkey and the colt and put on them their cloaks, and he sat on them. ⁸Most of the crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. ⁹And the crowds that went before him and that followed him were shouting, 'Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!'" (2 Kings 9:13, Psalm 118:26)

When the crowds laid down their "cloaks on the road," they likely were offering their *only* cloaks as a sign of deep <u>respect</u>.

"Hosanna" means "Save now," but it had also become an exclamation of praise.

This was the kind of <u>welcome</u> that made the Romans nervous, and the Jewish religious leaders were also extremely concerned.

The crowd's expectations had morphed to match what *they wanted*.

Jesus' plan, as the Messiah, the Son of David, King of kings and Lord of lords, wasn't to give us what we wanted but what we <u>needed</u>; it wasn't to conquer the *Romans* but win victory for us over <u>sin and death</u>.

The hope Jesus offers is ultimately not of this <u>world</u>, yet our road to hope has to go through Holy Week, just as Jesus' did – through his betrayal, beating, crucifixion and death to reach resurrection and life everlasting.

Matthew 16:23 (ESV): "But [Jesus] turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are a hindrance to me. For you are not setting your mind on the things of God, but on the things of man.""
