INTRODUCTION

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. **Did you find parts of this message disturbing? If so, which parts and why?**
2. "Faith is the most confused, misused, and abused concept in religion." Respond to that statement. Do you agree? Why or why not?
3. Think of a belief you hold that has a major influence on the way you live your life. In what ways do you look for evidence to support that belief? In what ways do you filter out evidence that contradicts that belief?
4. The gospels record that when Jesus died, his disciples' faith died. But when they finally came out of hiding, their messages wasn't, "Believe what Jesus taught." It was, "You killed him. God raised him. We've seen him. Say you're sorry." In what ways do the disciples' behavior and message challenge your assumptions about Christianity?
5. Read Acts 17:31. Do you agree that the "proof" of Jesus' resurrection is a compelling basis for personal faith? Why or why not?
6. When you think about Jesus, do you tend to focus on his teachings or his death and resurrection? How does that focus influence the way you answer the question, "Who is Jesus?"

MOVING FORWARD

Christians believe that when you place your faith in Christ's death, that single act of faith leads to forgiveness of sin. And that is why we said from the very beginning that the starting point for the Christian faith is a question: Who Is Jesus? A single event—the resurrection—changed how those closest to Jesus answered that question. In a moment, they went from unbelief to belief—the moment they saw him risen.
