Introduction

Seek the Word

Read John 13:1

• That last sentence of that verse says that Jesus loved them to the end, what is the significance of this statement during this time of Jesus' life?

Read John 19:28-29

• The imagery of the sponge with vinegar wine that was lifted to Jesus on the cross is impactful by itself let alone the pain Jesus suffered on his way to the cross, what does this say about Jesus as you walk through the crucifixion story?

Look at John 19:30 & Hebrew 9:26

- What was the meaning of the last words that Jesus said on the cross?
- What was the cultural parallel to Jesus dying on the cross and why is it important to the people then to the people now?

Talk About It

- What do you think it would look like to be among the crowd that day of Jesus' crucifixion?
- What could it look like to recognize that for those during that time to not have to crucify the perfect lamb because of the debt being paid in full by Jesus?
- Do you ever wonder if your debt is paid in full?
 - O How does the crucifixion answer to the questioning or doubt that we might have?
- How might your life change if you never doubted the fact of your salvation through Jesus?
- What are your next steps in your journey of faith in Jesus? (Baptism? Talking to a Pastor? Serving?)
