

Summary

This Mother's Day sermon focuses on the story of Hannah from 1 Samuel 1, a woman who struggled with infertility and deep emotional pain. Pastor Chris uses Hannah's journey from bitterness to breakthrough as a framework to encourage mothers and all believers facing closed doors in their lives. The message emphasizes that the same God who shuts doors can also open them, and that our deepest pain often drives us to our most powerful prayers. Hannah's story demonstrates that God hears our heartfelt cries, remembers our requests, and answers in His perfect timing. The sermon particularly honors mothers, acknowledging their sacrifices, silent struggles, and powerful prayers that shape families and communities.

Intro Prayer

Questions

- How do you think Hannah felt when people misunderstood her pain, and how can we better support those who are struggling silently?
- Pastor Chris mentioned that 'some doors no man can open.' What doors in your life feel closed right now, and how does Hannah's story give you hope?
- Hannah poured out her soul before the Lord in prayer. What does authentic, heartfelt prayer look like in your own life?
- Why do you think God sometimes allows us to wait for answers to our prayers, and how can waiting actually strengthen our faith?
- The sermon emphasized that mothers carry burdens others don't see. How can we better appreciate and support the mothers in our lives?
- Hannah promised to give Samuel back to God, recognizing children as gifts rather than possessions. How does this perspective change the way we view our relationships and blessings?
- After God answered her prayer, Hannah continued to praise Him. How can we maintain a heart of gratitude after receiving answers to prayer?
- Pastor Chris shared that we should praise God as much as we pray to Him. How might this change your prayer life and relationship with God?

Life Application

This week, identify one area of your life that feels 'shut up' or closed off. Commit to bringing this burden to God in honest, heartfelt prayer daily. Additionally, if you are a parent or have a mother figure in your life, take time to express specific gratitude for their sacrifices and prayers. Finally, practice spending equal time praising God for past answered prayers as you do asking for new requests.
