

Summary

This sermon focuses on the concept of pressing forward in faith, drawing from Philippians 3:12-14 where Paul speaks of pressing toward the mark for the prize of God's high calling. The pastor uses the Garden of Gethsemane as a central metaphor, explaining that it was a place of olive pressing where Jesus experienced the ultimate pressure before His crucifixion. The message emphasizes that while praise and worship are important, prayer is the foundation that must come first. Pastor Chris challenges the congregation, particularly the men, to commit to serious prayer and to understand that God uses pressure in our lives to shape us and extract what He wants from us, just as olives are pressed to produce oil. The sermon concludes with the powerful truth that God transforms our pressure into power for the next level of our spiritual journey.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, we come before You this morning with open hearts and minds, ready to receive what You have for us in this time together. We ask that You would speak to each person here according to their need and help us to be receptive to Your voice. Lord, prepare our hearts to understand the importance of pressing forward in our faith journey, even when we face difficulties and pressure. Help us to see that You are working in every situation for our good and Your glory. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

Ice Breaker

What's one activity or hobby that you can easily spend an hour doing without even realizing how much time has passed?

Key Verses

- Philippians 3:12-14
- Matthew 26:36-46

Questions

- Paul says he presses toward the mark for the prize of God's high calling. What does 'pressing forward' look like in your daily life as a Christian?

- Jesus asked His disciples to pray with Him for one hour, but they fell asleep. Why do you think we often struggle to commit time to prayer, and what can help us overcome this?
- Pastor Chris mentioned that this generation loves praise but needs to learn prayer. How can we balance both praise and prayer in our spiritual lives?
- In Gethsemane, Jesus said 'not my will, but thy will be done' while under intense pressure. How can we apply this attitude when facing our own difficult circumstances?
- The sermon describes how olives must be pressed to produce oil. Can you share about a time when God used pressure in your life to bring about something good?
- Pastor Chris challenged the men specifically about prayer and leadership. How can we encourage accountability and spiritual leadership in our families and church?
- What does it mean that 'God turns pressure into power' in your personal experience? How have you seen this principle work in your life or the lives of others?
- The message emphasizes not giving up when facing trials. What practical steps can we take to 'keep pressing' when we feel like quitting?

Life Application

This week, commit to spending focused time in prayer daily, even if it's just starting with 15-20 minutes. Find a specific area of pressure or challenge in your life and instead of avoiding it, ask God to show you how He wants to use that situation to shape you and develop your character. If you're a man, consider joining or starting a prayer group to support other men in their spiritual growth.

Key Takeaways
