Summary

In this sermon, Pastor Chris delivers a powerful message about the reality of Hell as described in Luke 16:19-31, focusing on the story of the rich man and Lazarus. The pastor emphasizes that Hell is a literal place of eternal torment where those who reject Jesus Christ will spend eternity, while Heaven awaits those who accept salvation through Christ.

The sermon highlights several reasons why preaching about Hell is necessary: to warn families, to counter false teachings, to follow Jesus' example (who preached more about Hell than Heaven), to motivate Christians to evangelize, and because people we know may end up there. Questions

- Pastor Chris said, 'If there's pastors out there and they're not preaching on hell, they don't really love people.' Do you agree or disagree with this statement, and why?

This week, I challenge you to identify one person in your life who may not know Jesus as their Savior. Commit to praying for them daily, asking God for an opportunity to share the gospel with them. Remember, sharing about salvation isn't just about warning of Hell, but offering the hope of Heaven through Jesus Christ. Prepare your personal testimony so you can briefly share how Christ changed your life, and be ready to explain the simple gospel message. Don't let fear stop you - remember that eternity is at stake, and as the pastor said, nothing is worth someone dying and going to Hell over.
