

Summary

In this powerful sermon, Pastor Chris delivers a stark message about the reality of hell and the importance of salvation through Jesus Christ. Drawing from Jonathan Edwards' famous sermon 'Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God,' the pastor emphasizes that hell is a literal, lonely, loud, and loathsome place that was created for the devil but awaits those who reject Christ. Pastor Chris repeatedly affirms his own salvation with the refrain 'I'm not going to hell,' while urging listeners to examine their own spiritual condition and make the choice to accept Christ before it's too late.

Ice Breaker

If you could visit any place in the world for a week, where would you go and why?

Key Verses

Questions

- The pastor repeatedly states 'I'm not going to hell.' What gives him this confidence, and do you share that same confidence about your eternal destination?
- The sermon mentions that 75% of Americans believe in hell, but only 4% believe they're going there. Why do you think there's such a disconnect between belief in hell and personal accountability?

- How does Pastor Chris describe hell? Which of these descriptions impacts you the most and why?
- Pastor Chris says, 'If you've really been saved and you sin after you've really been saved, you have a hard time sleeping.' Do you agree with this statement? How does conviction of sin work in your life?
- What does Pastor Chris mean when he says, 'Eternity is too long to be wrong'? How should this perspective impact our daily decisions?
- The sermon mentions 'faces in the flames' - people we know who may not be saved. Who comes to your mind, and what responsibility do you feel toward them?
- How does the pastor describe the difference between what happens to believers versus non-believers after death? What scriptures support this teaching?
- Pastor Chris mentions a spiritual awakening on the horizon with young people returning to church. Do you see evidence of this in our community? How can we participate in this movement?

Life Application

This week, identify one person in your life who may not know Jesus as their Savior. Commit to praying for them daily and look for an opportunity to have a conversation about faith with them. Remember the pastor's words about not wanting to be responsible for not telling someone about heaven to gain and hell to shun. Consider writing down what you would say if given the opportunity to share your faith, focusing on both God's love and the reality of eternity.
