

Summary

In this sermon, Pastor Chris emphasizes that every person is fearfully and wonderfully made by God for a specific purpose in His kingdom. The message focuses on three key questions: where we come from (created in God's image), why we're here (called to specific ministries), and where we're going after death. Pastor Chris shares a powerful testimony about a woman named Nan who, despite having cancer that took her nose, continued to serve in children's ministry and ultimately surrendered her addictions at the altar.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, as we gather to discuss Your Word today, we ask that You open our hearts and minds to understand Your purpose for our lives. Help us to recognize that we are fearfully and wonderfully made for Your kingdom's work. Guide our conversation and reveal to each of us what You want us to learn and apply from this message. Ice Breaker

Questions

- Pastor Chris stated that we are all 'fearfully and wonderfully made.' What does this mean to you personally, and how does it impact how you view your purpose?
- According to the sermon, what are some of the different ways people are called to serve in God's kingdom? Which of these resonates most with you?
- Pastor Chris emphasized that we're all called to evangelism. What barriers do you face when sharing your faith with others?
- How did the story of Nan and her bag at the altar impact you? What might be in your own metaphorical 'bag' that needs to be surrendered?

- The sermon mentioned starting evangelism in your own home. How can we better share Christ with our family members who don't know Him?
- What's the difference between temporarily laying our sins at the altar versus truly surrendering them like Nan did?
- Pastor Chris emphasized the importance of bringing children to hear God's Word. Why is this so crucial, and how can we be more intentional about it?
- How did the closing story about the father unable to save his son from the fire help you understand the urgency of sharing the gospel?

Life Application

This week, identify one person in your immediate circle (family, close friend, neighbor) who doesn't know Christ, and commit to praying for them daily. Then, take one tangible step toward sharing the gospel with them - whether that's inviting them to church, sharing your testimony, or simply asking if you can pray for a need in their life. Remember, as the sermon emphasized, we are all called to evangelism, and it starts with those closest to us.
