Scriptures: Luke 1; Genesis 3:14-19; Isaiah 9:2-7

Bottom Line: Jesus promises an end to all waiting, and that the waiting itself can be joyful.

Waiting for wonder can be full of joy and anticipation. It can also be full of fear and despair.

Waiting in the Christmas Story

Zechariah and Elizabeth waited for a child.

Israel waited for a promise to be fulfilled, and a Messiah.

Creation waits for restoration and redemption.

Jesus promises the end of all waiting.

How Can We Wait for Wonder Well?

The most important thing to come out of waiting is the person you're going to be on the other side.

Keep your mind and eyes open. God is creative, and the wonder He wants to bring into your life might not look like you're expecting.

God wants to bring wonder into the world through you.

3. Which story of waiting in the Christmas story stands out to you most?
4. How has God built you into a new person through a period of waiting? How has he surprised you with wonder when or where you weren't looking for it?
