

5 They answered him, "Jesus of Nazareth." Jesus said to them, "I am he." Judas, who betrayed him, was standing with them. 6 When Jesus said to them, "I am he," they drew back and fell to the ground. 7 So he asked them again, "Whom do you seek?" And they said, "Jesus of Nazareth."

John 18

8 Jesus answered, "I told you that I am he. So, if you seek me, let these men go." 9 This was to fulfill the word that he had spoken: "Of those whom you gave me I have lost not one."

10 Then Simon Peter, having a sword, drew it and struck the high priest's servant and cut off his right ear. (The servant's name was Malchus.) [Luke 22:51 But Jesus said, "No more of this!" John 18

12 So the band of soldiers and their captain and the officers of the Jews arrested Jesus and bound him. 13 First they led him to Annas, for he was the father-in-law of Caiaphas, who was high priest that year. 14 It was Caiaphas who had advised the Jews that it would be expedient that one man should die for the people.

John 19:10-11

10 "Do you refuse to speak to me?" Pilate said. "Don't you realize I have power either to free you or to crucify you?" 11 Jesus answered, "You would have no power over me if it were not given to you from above. Therefore the one who handed me over to you is guilty of a greater sin."

Commentary on John 19:11

"[The word translated] "Me" is very emphatic in the Greek; it is the refusal of Jesus to speak to one who possesses such supreme human authority that amazes Pilate."

Commentary on John 19:11

Pilate thought he had power, but what he had was the power to do wrong. He didn't have the power to do what was right. The right thing to do was to release an obviously innocent Man...To say, "I have power to do what the crowd wants me to do" is to say you have no power at all.

Matthew 27

15 Now at the feast the governor was accustomed to release for the crowd any one prisoner whom they wanted. 16 And they had then a notorious prisoner called Barabbas. 17 So when they had gathered, Pilate said to them, "Whom do you want me to release for you: Barabbas, or Jesus who is called Christ?" 18 For he knew that it was out of envy that they had delivered him up.

Barabbas

Jewish leaders accuse Jesus of fomenting a revolt against Roman rule and then they encourage the release of Barabbas who was already condemned for the same crime. This is no mere prisoner swap but a substitution. Jesus the innocent man takes the penalty for Barabbas the guilty man.
