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Child Dedication

A baby dedication is a ceremony in which believing parents make a commitment before the Lord to raise that child according to God's Word and God's ways.

Child Dedication

Christian parents who dedicate a child are making a promise to the Lord before the church congregation to do everything within their power to raise the child in a godly way — prayerfully — until he or she can make a decision on his or her own to follow God.

From the Greek word baptizō to dip repeatedly, to immerse, to submerge (of vessels sunk)

Believers Baptism

We practice believer baptism because this is the clear biblical pattern (believe and be baptized). There is no biblical evidence for the practice of infant "baptism" rather it is based on church tradition, adopted from ancient cultural (pagan) practices.

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Ethiopian eunuch mentioned in Acts 8 was a high court official of Candace, the queen of Ethiopia. He was in Israel to worship the Lord at the temple, A king would often castrate his servants to ensure they would not be tempted by the harem or to engage in sedition because there would be no way to have sons to sustain their own dynasty.
