- 2. Listen to your heart, speak to your heart


Rest in Our Keeper

Why do I face so many uncertainties?

What can I do to make a greater contribution to my generation?

Life Questions in The Fifties?

Why is time moving so fast? Why is my body becoming unreliable? How do I deal with my failures and my successes? How can my spouse and I reinvigorate our relationship now that the children are gone? Who are these young people who want to replace me? What do I do with my doubts and fears?

Will I have enough money for the retirement years if there are health problems and economic downturns?

Life Questions in The Sixties?

When do I stop doing the things that have defined me?
Why do I feel ignored by the younger population?
Do I have enough time to do all the things I've dreamed about in the past?
Who will be around me when I die?
Are the things I've believed in capable of taking me to the end?
Is there really life after death?
What do I regret?
What are the chief satisfactions of these many years of living?
What have I done that will outlive me?

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Life Questions in The Seventies/Eighties?

Does anyone even care who I once was? How much of my life can I still control? Is there anything I can still contribute? Why this anger and irritability? Is God really there for me? Am I ready to face death? When I die (how will it happen?), will I be missed or will the news of my death bring relief? Heaven? What is it like?
