

LIFE GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

When Peter and John healed the man at the Beautiful Gate and began preaching the resurrection, they stirred both wonder and opposition. Their story challenges us to live with courage, generosity, and uncontainable life — not in theory, but in practice.

1. Resurrection Life That Can't Be Buried

Resurrection isn't just a past event; it's the unstoppable life of God breaking through in the present.

- **Key Question:** Where have you seen resurrection life break through something that seemed finished, buried, or impossible — either in your own story or someone else's?
- What does it mean for you personally to "practice resurrection" in a real, concrete way this week — to bring life, hope, or healing into a specific situation?

2. Ordinary People, Extraordinary Boldness

Peter and John were described as "unschooled, ordinary men," yet their courage astonished the leaders around them.

- **Key Question:** What does boldness in the Spirit look like for an ordinary person today? How might God be calling you to step into that kind of courage in your daily life?
- Peter's boldness grew out of past failure — denial turned to courage. How have you seen God redeem your own weakness or mistakes and use them as fuel for new faith or obedience?

3. When Systems Resist Resurrection

Resurrection life is beautiful — but it also disrupts the structures and assumptions that prefer control over freedom.

- **Key Question:** What systems — in society, church culture, or even in your own habits — tend to resist the work of resurrection? How do we recognize when we've paved over God's movement?
- The sermon warned that resurrection life is "dangerous" because it can't be managed. How do we hold that tension — being bold enough to disrupt what needs to change, while still embodying grace and humility?

4. Bold Prayers and Embodied Faith

When threatened, the early believers didn't ask for safety; they prayed for boldness — and the place was shaken.

- **Key Question:** If you shifted your prayers from "make me safe" to "make me bold," what might change in your life, work, or relationships?
- Peter's miracle began as a simple act of kindness toward a man in need. What does that teach us about where boldness really begins — and how might God be inviting you to take a small, Spirit-led step this week?
