



Was Flew Correct?

(about the Golden Rule)

Does appear a lot in ancient philosophy and religious writing but it can be in one of three forms:

- One should treat others as one would like others to treat oneself (positive or directive form).
- What you wish upon others, you wish upon yourself (empathic or responsive form).
- One should not treat others in ways that one would not like to be treated (negative or prohibitive form).


In 1993 a "Declaration Toward a Global Ethic", was drafted by a gathering of 143 leaders from the Worlds major religions... It was built around an endorsement of the 'Golden Rule'.

It certainly provides a broad base for a fully human ethic.

The Golden Rule from other sources...

The earliest form is found in an Ancient Egyptian story, 'The Eloquent Peasant' (~1850 BC) which reads: 'Do to the doer, to make him do'.

If interpreted kindly, this is the **Empathic/Responsive** Form.



A Late Period Ancient Egyptian papyrus (664–323 BC) contains an early Negative Version: 'That which you hate to be done to you, do not do to another.'



The Sanskrit 'Mahabharata' an epic poem (composed from the 8<sup>th</sup> century BC onwards) contains a version of the positive form, given as advice in a discussion between a wise advisor and a King: 'treat others as you treat yourself'.



— Mahābhārata Shānti-Parva 167:9

The Tamil 'Tirukkural' a collection of wisdom compiled between 200 BC and 500 AD, contains various versions of the Negative Form, such as: 'Do not do to others what you know has hurt yourself'



- Kural 316.

The Pahlavi Texts of Persian
Zoroastrianism (composed between 300 BC and 1000 AD) Contain two versions of the Negative Form:
'Nature alone is good which refrains from doing to another whatsoever is not good for itself.'



Dadisten-I-dinik 94,5; and 'Whatever is disagreeable to yourself do not do unto others.'

Shayast-na-Shayast 13:29

Ancient Greece had multiple versions of the Negative Form:

- "Avoid doing what you would blame others for doing." –
   Thales (c. 624 BC c. 546 BC)
- "What you do not want to happen to you, do not do it yourself either." – Sextus the Pythagorean.
- "Do not do to others that which angers you when they do it to you." – Isocrates (436–338 BC)

In Rome the Stoic Seneca the Younger (~ 4 BC – 65 AD) expresses a qualified version of the Positive Form in a work on the treatment of slaves: "Treat your inferior as you would wish your superior to treat you."

## RABBI HILLEL (A GENERATION BEFORE JESUS):

Once there was a gentile who came before Shammai, and said to him: "Convert me on the condition that you teach me the whole Torah while I stand on one foot. Shammai pushed him aside with the measuring stick he was holding.

The same fellow came before Hillel, and Hillel converted him, saying: "That which is despicable to you, do not do to your fellow, this is the whole Torah, and the rest is commentary, go and learn it."
