

Group Questions

1. The sermon opens with the idea that “truth or consequences” is unavoidable. Where do you see this reality playing out in everyday life—and how does it apply to Jesus’ claims?
2. C.S. Lewis framed Jesus as “Liar, Lunatic, or Lord.” Which of these do you think people most commonly believe today, and why?
3. Jesus presents multiple “witnesses” to His identity. Which of the four witnesses (John the Baptist, Jesus’ works, Scripture, the Spirit) stands out most to you personally, and why?
4. Looking at the works of Jesus (miracles, signs, etc.), how do they strengthen the case that He is truly the Son of God?
5. Jesus says the Scriptures testify about Him ([John 5:39](#)). How have you seen Jesus revealed throughout the Bible—not just in the New Testament?
6. The sermon says one consequence of rejecting Jesus is that you cannot properly understand Scripture. Why do you think understanding the Bible is tied to knowing Jesus?
7. Another consequence listed is that you cannot truly know, love, or honor God apart from Jesus. How does this challenge common cultural beliefs about God?
8. Jesus makes it clear that rejecting Him leads to judgment. How should this truth shape the way we think about our own faith and how we share the gospel with others?
9. The sermon ends by flipping the consequences: embracing Jesus leads to life, understanding, and relationship with God. Which of these “positive consequences” have you experienced in your own life?
10. What is one practical step you can take this week to more fully embrace the truth about Jesus and live in light of it?
