Martha's Musings

Talking to sick people on the phone is frequently something that a nurse must do. Phone triage can be very tricky. Some problems are CLEAR: chest pain, profuse bleeding, loss of consciousness, slurring of speech, etc., all go to ER. But I learned a valuable lesson: it is what people do NOT say that is often the root of the problem. The person on the line is yelling at me, but they are not mad at me – they are upset over something completely outside my purview. Only careful, kind probing can allow someone the peace to be able to share personal pain. I realized that this type of thinking also comes in handy in regular social issues. The smart-aleck clerk may be hiding the pain of the recent loss of a grandparent. The person driving the car in front of you at a snail's pace may not be able to go any faster, because her tears are obscuring her vision. The man in line at the pharmacy ahead of you, who is asking the pharmacist to repeat everything she says, cannot concentrate because his child just entered a drug rehab facility. When the actions of others seem rude or bothersome, try to keep in mind that there is stuff you do not know. My Mom always said, "There but for the grace of God go I", which is a good reminder to be grateful. But your time will come, and kindness will keep you sane. And you will be so very grateful for it.
