# Sanctified

(shall we continue to sin?)

Romans 6:1-14

Sanctification: the gradual process of becoming like Jesus, made possible by the Spirit's work within us.

Every other religion: "If I obey, then God might accept me."

Christianity: "Because God has accepted me, I want to obey."

"I want to obey" is sanctification happening in your life.

# Romans: an exposition of the gospel.

- I. We all need a savior because of sin (1:18-3:20).
- II. Jesus makes us righteous before God (3:21-5:21).
- III. God sets righteous people apart (6:1-8:39).
- IV. God is good, even when evil exists (9:1-11:36).
- V. The gospel transforms the way we live (12:1-15:13).
- VI. The enemy will attack (15:14-16:27).

Big Idea: Sin no longer has power over us; so, we live differently.

What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound?

<sup>2</sup> By no means! How can we who died to sin still live in it? <sup>3</sup> Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? <sup>4</sup> We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life.

<sup>5</sup> For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. <sup>6</sup> We know that our old self was crucified with him in order that the body of sin might be brought to nothing, so that we would no longer be enslaved to sin. <sup>7</sup> For one who has died has been set free from sin. <sup>8</sup> Now if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. <sup>9</sup> We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. <sup>10</sup> For the death he died he died to sin, once for all, but the life he lives he lives to God. <sup>11</sup> So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, to make you obey its passions. <sup>13</sup> Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness. <sup>14</sup> For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

Big Idea: Sin no longer has power over us; so, we live differently.

# Shall we continue to sin?

- i. We are dead to sin (vv. 1-4).
- ii. We are united with Christ (vv. 5-10).
- iii. We fight the good fight (vv. 11-14).

#### 1. Dead to sin (vv. 1-4).

"What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound? <sup>2</sup> By no means!

How can we who <u>died</u> to sin still live in it? <sup>3</sup> Do you not know that all of us who have been *baptized* into Christ Jesus were *baptized* into his <u>death</u>? <sup>4</sup> We were <u>buried</u> therefore with him by *baptism* into <u>death</u>, **in order that**, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, **we too might walk in newness of life.**"

## Baptism illustrates the believer's relation to:

- i. The Old Self, it has died with Christ (cf. v. 6).
- ii. Sin, it no longer has dominion over us.
- iii. Christ, we are unified with him.
- iv. The new life, we want to live differently.

"When you come to Christ, you lose your life as you know it, and that's a great thing. You lose your life to find entirely new life in him"

4 ways to walk in a newness of life.

- i. Pray.
- ii. Leave the old man behind.
- iii. Study the Word.
- iv. Fellowship with believers.

#### 2. United with Christ (vv. 5-11).

<sup>5</sup> For if we have been <u>united with him</u> in a death like his, we shall certainly be <u>united with him</u> in a resurrection like his. <sup>6</sup> We know that our old self was <u>crucified with him</u> in order that the body of sin might be brought to nothing, **so that we would no longer be enslaved to sin**. <sup>7</sup> For one who has died has been **set free from sin**. <sup>8</sup> Now if we have <u>died with Christ</u>, we believe that we will also <u>live with him</u>. <sup>9</sup> We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; **death no longer has dominion** over him. <sup>10</sup> For the death he died he died to sin, once for all, but the life he lives he lives to God. <sup>11</sup> So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God <u>in Christ Jesus</u>.

God unites Christians with Christ so that what happened to Christ is counted by God as happening to us. His death is our death. His life is our life. We are united with Christ.

#### Union with Christ

- i. God established the union when Christ died (v. 5; 1Co 1:30).
- ii. We join the union through our faith (5:1; 18).
- iii. When Christ died, sinful me died too (v. 6; Gal 2:20).
- iv. If we have died with Christ, we also live with Him (v. 8).

#### 3. Fight the good fight (vv. 12-14)

Let not sin therefore **reign** in your mortal body, to make you obey its passions. <sup>13</sup> Do not **present your members** to sin as **instruments** for unrighteousness, but **present yourselves** to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as **instruments** for righteousness. <sup>14</sup> For sin will have no **dominion** over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

The word "instrument" could be translated as weapon.

<sup>&</sup>quot;present yourselves" indicates a habitual use.

## A war of two kingdoms: Sin and God.

- i. Citizens of God's kingdom can commit mutiny.
- ii. Sin wants to control you (v. 12).
- iii. We choose to be weapons for sin or God (v. 13).
- iv. Sin has no dominion over us (v. 14).

# Keys for winning the battle:

- i. Don't let sin control you (v. 12).
- ii. Don't let sin use you (v. 13a).
- iii. Practice doing good (v. 13b).
- iv. Remember your citizenship (v. 14).

Sin no longer has power over you. Take steps to live differently.
