- D. Teach them forgiveness in how you forgive them.
- E. Have conversations on the reality and meaning of love.

- A. Give them the proper push back they need to grow.
- B. Teach them repercussions for actions.
- C. Teach them repercussions for truth ignored.
- D. Teach them pleasure is not the end.
- E. Teach them pain can be a good thing and teaching method.
- F. Be a person they respect discipline from or else rebellion is inevitable .
